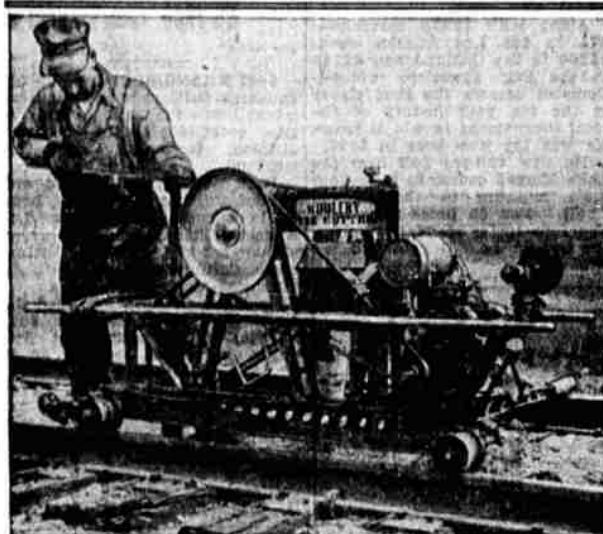

Billions for a Handicap!

Farmers especially will be interested in what Senator Clyde M. Reed of Kansas has to say about transportation, because for many years he has represented farm organizations in transportation matters. Recently, in Chicago, he spoke on the need for a sound national transportation policy.

"What I am trying to do as a United States Senator," he said, "is to help the country straighten out its tangled transportation situation so that the most efficient and economical service may be given to the public at the lowest cost."

Characterizing most river improvement schemes as "rackets," Senator Reed asserted that "inland waterway transportation is not low cost transportation; it is the highest cost transportation as compared with the highways or the railroads. The only reason for lower charges is the subsidy paid by taxpayers out of the public treasury."

"The important thing in this connection," he said, "is whether we are going to continue to tax the whole people for the benefit of a comparatively small number of people. Are the cities and trade centers located off the rivers to be, not only taxed, but additionally penalized by lower freight charges given their competitors located on the rivers? My answer is, 'No!'"

"Farmers as a whole," the Kansas Senator declared, "have not profited a cent by the billions of dollars spent on 'river improvement.'" The promoters of river navigation, he added, "hold out to the public the idea that it is getting some benefit from raids upon the public treasury," but that "in most cases the commodities so moved are sold to the public, not on the basis of lower river rates, but on a basis of the higher railroad rate."

"There is no more outrageous and no more unjustifiable, and no more flagrant waste and misuse of public money," he said, "than in subsidizing high cost transportation for the benefit of a comparatively few people, and creating favoritism and discrimination between localities, trade centers and cities."

"I proclaim my belief here and now," said Senator Reed, "that a sound public policy would be one that imposed upon all traffic using facilities created out of the public treasury, tolls that would reasonably recompense the taxpayers for the money taken from them. If that were done, traffic would move by the cheapest and best route."

FRAUD COMPLAINT FILED IN COURT

A complaint charging the transference of property with intent to defraud was filed at the county clerk's office this week in the case of Martha Webber, formerly Martha Lightfoot, versus Harold Lightfoot and Emma Lightfoot.

The plaintiff obtained a divorce July 22, 1931, at which time she received \$100 suit money, \$35 per month for the support of a minor child, and \$32.70 costs. The plaintiff asks the setting aside and declaring fraudulent the deed of conveyance.

CONTRACT BREACH CHARGED IN SUIT

A complaint charging the breach of a contract was filed at the county clerk's office by Frank J. Burns against Ivy M. Hugo and Coral Martin.

The complaint alleges that Hugo, owner of the Embassy Country club, drew up a contract on November 13, 1939, making Burns manager of the club until January 1, 1941. The contract allegedly was to have terminated only upon sale of the premises.

The plaintiff alleges that Burns took over on November 13, 1939, until January 8, 1940, and that he was then forced out of business, and that no sale of the property has been made.

Those taking advantage of the courtesy airmail service offered by Oregon Airways, Inc., were advised Friday by officials of the airways that letters must bear six cent stamps instead of three cents, as was previously announced. The announcement was made by officials who arrived on the regular flight Friday.

The mail is cancelled at the postoffice at Portland or at the intermediate stops at Bend, Redmond and Prineville.

For the convenience of those using the service, mail may be left at the Klamath Furniture company, 721 Main street. Mail deposited before 12 noon will be placed on the northbound plane at 1 p. m. At the airport mail will be accepted until the plane's departure.

The company operates passenger and express service daily except Sunday between Portland and Klamath Falls, with regular stops at the three central Oregon cities.

JUNIOR POLICE FACE TRAFFIC PROBLEMS HERE

IMMUNIZATION OF PUPILS REPORTED

Carrying out the program of immunization in the Klamath county schools was reported by Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, Klamath county health officer, who visited Altamont elementary school Thursday and there vaccinated 52 boys and girls for smallpox and gave 65 students their first shot of toxoid for diphtheria.

Dr. Rozendal stated the present program calls for a second shot to be given the Altamont children February 3. On February 13 the doctor will give the second diphtheria shot at Chillicothe. He conducted physical examinations at the Shasta school Wednesday, and this week addressed members of the city school board on the public health program.

PRUNING TRIED ON SAMPLE FIR TREES

EUGENE, Jan. 23 (AP)—Sample fir trees in two 400-acre sections of the Willamette valley will be pruned in an effort to determine whether the trimming of lower limbs improves the quality of lumber.

The civilian conservation corps will undertake the experiment, officers said Saturday. It is believed a "pruned" Douglas fir will ripen into a superior "peeler" log.

DESCHUTES ANGLERS WOULD OPEN LAKES

Deschutes County Sportsmen's association favors removal in 1940 of all Deschutes county and mid-Cascade lake closures with the exception of those parts of lakes and streams set aside for spawning purposes.

If existing closures are removed as recommended, fishing would be permitted this year in Sparks lake, Hilo lake, and Three Creeks lake.

A trout distribution committee of the Deschutes association calls for planting 5,500,000 fish in Deschutes national forest lakes and streams, including a part of northern Klamath county. The Bend group favors planting more German brown trout. Little Deschutes river may receive a planting of some of these sporty fish.
