Ohio. The relief situation was described as "pitiful" in Missouri where the wave fell short of predictions but went well below zero. Most relief offices were snowed under with requests for aid.

From Texas to Florida, southerners shivered in the continued abnormal cold. One of the heaviest frosts in years extended to Tampa, Fla., and in Miami chilled fugitives from the northern cold sought blankets, firewood and heating equipment.

Only main highways in Virginia were opened as crews were hampered by a shortage of proper equipment to cope with the "once-in-20-years" snow. A 20-inch snowfall resulted in roof collapses at an armory, a tobacco warehouse and an airplane hangar. Richmond's transportation remained crippled.

The snowfall this morning covered the entire United States, except the immediate gulf and south Atlantic coasts and most of the extreme western parts of the Pacific states.

North Dakota reported warmer conditions. Bemidji, Minn., had -14, and Minneapolis and St. Paul -5.

Subzero cold was general in Iowa, where the temperatures were from 25 to 30 degrees below normal. Red Oak reported an official -23. Most of Nebraska chilled with below zero cold, some as low as -25.

The mercury fell steadily in Wisconsin as the wave swept eastward. Milwaukee reported -1. Michigan had a few subzero readings and a record itself to meet the forecasted "much colder" today and tomorrow.

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 25 (AP)—Forty-seven resolutions supporting a third term for President Roosevelt were introduced today before the United Mine Workers of America convention, providing an anomalous aftermath to John L. Lewis' split with the new deal. No immediate action was taken by the 2000 delegates on the resolutions from locals in Ohio, West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, Alabama, Wyoming and Maryland.

A hope Lewis "someday would be president of the United States" was expressed in a resolution from a Sharon, W. Va., group.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—President Roosevelt heard from an administration executive today strong sentiment was "very strong" that he run for another term.

His informant was Guy T. Helvering, internal revenue commissioner just back from the Midwest.

The president talked, too, about the Ohio political situation with Senator Donahay (D-Ohio) but there was no hint of what tangent their discussion took.

Another democratic senator on his calling list was Burton K. Wheeler of Montana who told reporters yesterday it would be difficult for the democrats to win again with Roosevelt.

When Wheeler came out of the White House, he said "no politics" had figured in his conference.

Heads bared to the sub-freezing mountain air, thousands met the train here this morning, lined the drive as the funeral procession drove to the capitol, where the grey steel casket lay in state most of the day.

Flowers masked the background, little sprays from humble friends, great pieces from the United States senate, from some of the nation's great newspapers, from many groups and distinguished individuals, including the president and Mrs. Roosevelt. In his hands, the senator clasped a faded little bouquet.

A quartet sang "Lead Kindly Light," the Episcopal burial service followed, then a benediction and the casket was made ready for interment in peaceful Morris Hill cemetery.

TOWNSEND BASES NEW PENSION IDEA ON INCOME TAX

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend has proposed a new plan for paying old-age pensions up to \$200 a month.

The suggestion, incorporated in a bill which Senator Downey (D-Calif.) is expected to introduce, differs from the old one mainly in that the pension fund would be derived from a 2 per cent tax on gross income of persons and companies with incomes of more than \$250 a month. The old bill, defeated in the last session of congress, provided a 2 per cent transactions tax.

The funds derived from the tax would be divided monthly among citizens over 60, with a \$200. The \$200 figure is "good strategy," Townsend explained to 65 senators and representatives last night at a dinner of the movement's legislative steering committee.

"If we don't hold to the \$200-a-month ceiling," he said, "somebody may come along with a new plan and say, 'Let's boost the old man's ante.'"

Octogenarian Wins Exoneration in Love-Theft Case

SAN RAFAEL, Calif., Jan. 25 (AP)—Dr. Byron Haines, who was accused in a \$200,000 alienation of affections suit of being a love thief at 84 years of age, had a jury's verdict today that he was no such offender.

The jury returned a verdict in his favor last night, denying damages to Capt. James Willey, who testified the retired dentist had stolen the affections of Mrs. Lillian Willey, 37, the plaintiff's divorced wife.

"I feel that the verdict is a complete vindication of what amounted to a vicious attack upon the reputation of a perfectly respectable lady," said the white-haired defendant.

Willey, former federal steamship inspector, did not comment, and his attorneys made no immediate announcement of plans to appeal the verdict, returned before Superior Judge Edward I. Butler after a three-day trial.

D. Haines said his association with Mrs. Willey was nothing more than "a very beautiful friendship."

20-YEAR RESIDENT OF COUNTY PASSES

Mr. John "Mike" Mirich, for the past 20 years a resident of Klamath county, died at Klamath Valley hospital Thursday morning following an illness of the past six weeks. Mr. Mirich was 55 years old at the time of his death. He was a native of Yugoslavia and during his residence in this

country had been employed in the woods by both Lamm Lumber company and Ewanna Box company. He was well known to woodsmen throughout the district. The remains are at the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home and announcement of services will be made later.

MAPS MAILED TO GERMANY, CLAIM

LONDON, Jan. 25 (AP)—Maps of "potential military value" are being sent to Germany by Nazi sympathizers in the United States, officials of economic warfare alleged today in justification of the interception of U. S. mails by the British contraband control.

Great Britain last week rejected the United States government's protest against interference with mail bound for neutral countries and claimed to have given Washington evidence of "organized traffic in contraband on considerable scale" between the U. S. and Germany.

A spokesman of the ministry of economic warfare, explaining why it is necessary to interfere with mails on the high seas, gave American newspaper correspondents detailed figures indicating that large amounts of money, diamonds, pearls and other valuables destined for Germany have been found in American letters and parcels during contraband searches.

He also charged that shipments of food to Germany by German firms in the United States have reached the proportions of a "raquet" and that the Germans are profiting at the expense of United States residents contributing money to buy food parcels for relatives and friends in the Reich.

The spokesman was reluctant to go into details regarding the "military maps" said to have reached Germany from the United States but said:

"They are quite important maps of European and non-European places and, for the most part, are mostly published maps with a number of markings which in certain circumstances might be of considerable military value."

Candidates nominated for executive committee posts included Peter Zimmerman, Yumbilla; Fred Goff, Roseburg; W. A. Johnson, Grants Pass; Henry Gustafson, North Bend; L. A. Lewis, Klamath Falls, and Minnie McFarland, Boardman. Three will be elected.
