

DOERNBECHER BRIDGE PARTY WINS SUPPORT

Interest is high in the forthcoming benefit bridge party to be given for the Doernbecher hospital for children in Portland by women of the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club on Saturday, January 27, at 2 o'clock in the Willard hotel.

There are three ways in which women of the city may help swell the fund which each year Klamath Falls Library club sends to Doernbecher hospital. Mrs. D. E. Van Vactor, party chairman, pointed out women could attend the card party, drop in for tea, or send supplies or money, both of which are badly needed.

Chapter AU of PEO Sisterhood, and the American Legion auxiliary have sent supplies of towels and wash cloths, but such articles as diapers, bath robes, toy bags, smocks or little cotton dresses, quilts and boys' shorts are still in great demand. A box will be placed near the door at the tea to receive articles as they are brought Saturday.

Mrs. Rollo C. Groesbeck, who is state chairman of Doernbecher hospital, had the following to say:

"Of the \$20,000 pledged to the Doernbecher hospital fund by the federation in 1935, less than \$1000 remains to be paid. We are proud of our hospital which is officially known as 'The Doernbecher Memorial Hospital for Children of the University of Oregon Medical School.' We are proud of its two services, for its functions first as a hospital, caring for sick and crippled children, and secondly, as a training school for doctors and nurses so that they may go out over the northwest better prepared to care for our children and grandchildren."

"It is one of the 17 educational institutions of the state, under the board of higher education, and receives an allotment of funds as such, but the funds cannot be stretched far enough. Quoting Miss Phelps, the superintendent, 'Our funds are never sufficient for our needs. It would have been hard to carry on without the generous direct contributions of food, supplies, and services given by the numerous women's clubs,'

the men's clubs, individuals, physicians, surgeons, nurses, teachers, welfare workers, and others. The help is still needed. All contributions, large or small, are welcomed. Miss Phelps continues, 'Know your hospital, what it needs to help its work along, what it can do for sick, crippled, or injured children.'"
