Passion Play To Appear Here On February 9, 10, 11

The famed Luenen Passion Play will appear at the high school auditorium under the sponsorship of the Klamath Falls Kiwanis club for three days, beginning Friday, February 9, through Sunday and Sunday afternoons.

President Ted Medford of the Kiwanis club made this announcement Thursday, reporting on action taken by the board of directors of the club. The Kiwanis, he said, are sponsoring the presentation in the belief it will be a contribution to the spiritual and cultural advancement of the community.

The Passion play is one of the oldest of dramatic entertainments and has grown from a crude beginning, with centuries of tradition and development behind it. The Luenen passion play was first presented in the year 1242. It was during the seventeenth century that the laymen became a part of the play. Its dialogue, which up to this time had been in the Latin language, was changed to the native tongue, causing some changes in the original manner of presentation. The first group of laymen to give interpretation to the sacred play was carefully selected by the monks. Their ability was put on an equal basis with their moral fitness. The various members chosen at this time soon started to train their children for the proper interpretation of their respective parts, and thus started a tradition which is practiced to this very day.

For the past six generations, members of the Meier family have had the duty to give interpretation to the most sacred of characters, that of "The Christ." Josef Meier, the seventh in line, has succeeded in translating this age-old story of the Cross into the English language and bringing it to America. His background and education have enabled him to make it one of America's outstanding dramatic stage productions. Mr. Meier is a young man of 33 years, who was so much

impressed by the conditions existing in the United States and particularly by its constitution that he sought citizenship here, and a permanent location for the passion play. He has been successful in both endeavors. 1938 saw him become a citizen, and during the same year arrangements were completed with Spearfish, S. D., for a permanent home of the passion play. Every summer for three months the Luenen Passion play will be shown there in an open-air setting, with hundreds of participants. It is Mr. Meier's aim to establish in the Black Hills of South Dakota the same tradition which is carried on in Luenen, Germany, by his brother.

The Passion play comes to Klamath Falls with all its old world tradition and artistry. It has not lost any of its beauty and power through the translation. Mammoth scenes are created, blending one into the other, keeping the continuity of the story intact. In twenty-two scenes, vivid and colorful, this realistic story is told by well prepared players. One of the most notable technical displays of the Luenen company is their remarkable lighting arrangement. Costumes are of authentic color and design. A large mixed chorus will sing the many beautiful chorals.

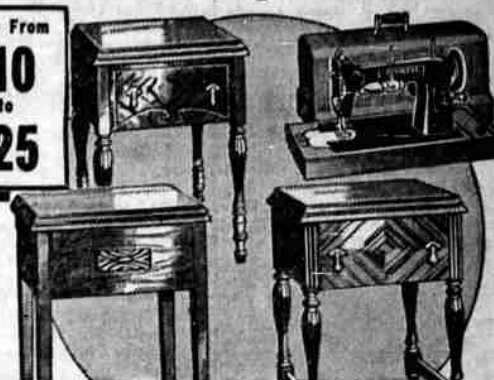
