

TRIBUTE PAID SCHORTGEN IN SERVICE HERE

Hundreds of friends gathered in the Elks temple Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock to pay final respects to Henry Ernest Schortgen, for eight years city building inspector, who died suddenly at his home on Adams street early Tuesday morning.

Services were conducted by the Elks lodge and by the Disabled American Veterans at the graveside in Linkville cemetery. Echo taps were sounded by two American Legionnaires, Carroll Morrison and S. V. Pickett, members of Mr. Schortgen's post.

Members of the city hall family attended in a body as did auxiliary members of the veteran groups with which Mr. Schortgen was affiliated. A profusion of floral offerings sent by friends throughout the county testified to the high esteem in which Mr. Schortgen was held by his community.

Funeral services were members of the city police force in full uniform. The city hall closed at 1:30 o'clock in respect to Mr. Schortgen's memory.

Browder Backed As Candidate For President

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (AP)—A 5,441-signature petition naming Earl Browder the communist candidate for representative from the fourteenth congressional district was filed last night a few hours after he served notice of appeal from his passport fraud conviction.

New bail of \$7,500—the same amount under which he had been free before he was sentenced to four years and fined \$2,000—also was made.

Trial of Robert W. Wiener, financial secretary of the communist party, USA, which Browder heads, was postponed until next Tuesday by Judge Vincent L. Liebell in federal court. Wiener, indicted December 4 by the same grand jury that indicted Browder on similar charges and whose real name was given as Welwel Warzower, pleaded innocent to the indictment. His bail was set at \$10,000. He was identified as a Russian-born alien who came to this country as an immigrant in 1914 and who since had posed as an American-born citizen.

RANDALL AWARDED JOB AS FLIER IN WILDLIFE SURVEY

Bill Randall, manager of the Klamath Air Service, has been awarded a contract for flying in a wildlife survey and census in the Reno district, it was learned Wednesday.

The award was made to Randall by the forest service. He will go to Reno for the survey some time between January 24 and February 24.

ARTICLE DESCRIBES CLEAR LAKE STORAGE RESERVOIR PROJECT

An article in the current issue of the Reclamation Era, by Fred C. Langell, describes recent work to provide additional storage in Clear Lake reservoir. Langell is superintendent of CCC camp 41, and the Reclamation Era is the magazine publication of the U. S. reclamation bureau.

Flashboard supports were installed on the spillway and the earth embankment was raised three feet. A crest width of 20 feet was maintained. A timber truss bridge, replacing the original structure spanning the tail-race, was constructed.

An additional storage of 84,000 acre-feet was provided in the construction work. Much of the job was done by CCC enrollees.
