

PETITIONS FOR SUMP AID GET CHAMBER OKAY

TULE LAKE—Resolutions drafted on the Tulake sump situation asking for government financial aid were adopted 100 per cent by the California State chamber of commerce in session in Sacramento. It was reported at Monday's luncheon meeting of the local chamber by W. H. Anderson, president, who appeared before the state body.

Literature and photographs depicting conditions in the flooded area, submitted by the Klamath Falls chamber, drew marked attention also. The resolutions were first referred to a committee during the morning session and the unanimous vote came during the luncheon hour.

Modoc County Supervisor "Pete" Smelter, a guest of the Tulake chamber covering proposed construction work on the Canby-Hatfield highway planned for next spring by the forest service, stated that it is expected that work will get underway as soon as weather permits.

With \$10,000 already appropriated from Modoc county funds to match a like amount donated by the state highway commission, the "missing link" in the highway will be the first stretch to get attention.

W. H. Anderson, returning from Sacramento last Saturday where he appeared before the state chamber of commerce in regard to the sump situation, conferred also with Gordon Jacobs, of the Klamath county board of supervisors, who stated that \$25,000 will be available also in the spring for work on the Skikyou county end of the project.

One third of the highway will be finished this year, one third next year and the remaining one third in 1942. When finished and brought up to state highway standard it will be absorbed into the state system.

EARLY RESIDENT OF MALIN PASSES

MALIN—Word was received here this week of the death of James "Joe" Kuter, 40, for many years a resident of Malin, who, with his family, left here five years ago for Hillsboro, Ore., where he purchased farm property. Mr. Kuter came to Klamath county when about eight years of age and his father was one of the original Bohemian settlers. The family lived west of Malin on the highway. Mrs. Kuter for a number of years was librarian of the county branch library here.

Death came in a logging accident but no particulars have as yet been learned by his sister, Mrs. Frank Victorine of Malin.

He was born in Czechoslovakia, being brought by his parents to America when three years of age. He enlisted from Klamath county for service in the World war.

His widow, two sons and two daughters survive.

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COURT HEARS RECEIVERSHIP CONTROVERSY

LAKEVIEW—The circuit court was in session yesterday for the purpose of hearing the objections of the First National bank of Portland to the allowance of compensation to Forrest E. Cooper, a local attorney, who for the past 18 months has served as receiver of the defunct Lakeview Pine Lumber company, and who has served as his own attorney.

The controversy centered for the most part upon the question of the value of the receiver's services in defeating the preference of the bank to the sum of \$39,500, which the receiver obtained in the recent suit of the First National bank of Portland versus Lakeview Pine Lumber company and others, for the benefit of the unsecured creditors of the firm. The attorneys for the bank contended that, assuming that the recent suit over the alleged warehouse receipts which

the bank claimed to have held covering the lumber inventory of the Lakeview Pine Lumber company was a most important case, yet the receiver should receive no more compensation than if it had been an ordinary unimportant piece of litigation. The bank was the only creditor to enter a protest to the allowance of the receiver's petition for compensation.
