

FUNDS SET FOR RE-ALIGNMENT OF WEED ROAD

Funds have been budgeted by California road authorities for re-alignment of the Weed highway from its junction with No. 99 at Weed, for one and one-half miles toward Klamath Falls, according to a letter from California road engineers received by the chamber of commerce Friday.

This will carry the reconstruction to a point where re-alignment was effected some time ago, and will straighten the road through Weed. Heretofore, the route has followed several turns through a section of the town.

An entirely new junction will be provided through construction of an overpass in Weed for the Weed-Klamath road. This overpass will be located just to the west of the roundhouse on the Southern Pacific tracks. A way will permit travelers to leave or enter No. 99, the Pacific highway, from either north or south.

Contract for the overpass has been let.

SNOWCAST

Crater Lake: Although the roads are covered with fresh snow, snowplows are keeping open the south and west entrance to the park and also the road to the rim. However, chains are needed. Twenty-four inches of new snow have fallen since January 23 making a total snow depth of 69 inches. Skis will sink about six inches in the soft, unpacked snow. Temperature at 8 o'clock Friday morning was 25 degrees—maximum temperature for the past 24 hours being 31 degrees and minimum 27. Snow has been falling steadily and there is a moderate southeast wind. At the time of this writing, the overnight accommodations have all been taken for this weekend with the exception of space for one in the women's dormitory. Every effort is being made to provide the usual parking facilities at Annie Spring checking station, park headquarters, and the rim. Telephone, first aid equipment, and warming room facilities are available at all three of these places. Meals and short orders may be obtained at park headquarters. There are marked ski trails leading from the rim to park headquarters for both novice and expert skiers.

Diamond Lake: Highway 230 past Diamond Lake is open to The Dalles-California highway but chains are advised. The new snow is mixed with rain, making a total depth of approximately 8 inches of heavy, wet snow. Temperature at time of reporting Friday morning was 33 degrees—maximum for the past 24 hours being 36 degrees and minimum 26. A strong, south wind is blowing, bringing a combination of snow and rain. The ice on the lake is topped with slush.

Lake of the Woods: The roads leading to Butte Falls and Ashland are closed. The road leading to Klamath Falls is open but chains are necessary. Four inches of new snow have fallen since Wednesday making a total depth of 8 inches at time of reporting Friday morning. The snow is a normal pack. Temperature at 8 o'clock Friday morning was 32 degrees—maximum for the past 24 hours was 38 degrees and minimum 22. A strong, southwest wind is blowing and snow is falling. Ice on the lake is topped with 4 inches of slush so there is no skating.

Which is new and has fallen since last week. Surface snow is soft and wet. Temperature at 6 p. m. Thursday was 35 degrees. A southwest wind was blowing and it was snowing hard. This area is proud to report the completion of a new ski lift which will be in operation Sunday. Skiing lessons are being given beginning at 2 p. m. Sunday.

Mt. Shasta-Sierra Alpine Lodge: There has been a heavy storm over this area, and a special party has been sent up to investigate conditions. However, McCloud avenue road is expected to be opened a distance of five miles to the snow line by this weekend. Chains are necessary. Twenty-four inches of soft, new snow have fallen at Sierra Alpine lodge making a total depth of 120 inches, with a surface varying from soft to wind-packed. There is no skating at Abrams lake. At the time of writing, the condition of the Everett Memorial highway had not been received but the latest report can be heard over KGO at 9 o'clock tonight. The temperature and weather at Mt. Shasta City at 8 o'clock Friday morning was 41 degrees—maximum for the past 24 hours was 45 degrees and minimum 33. There was a southerly five-mile-an-hour wind and occasional rain.

Snowman's Hill: No snow for skiing.

Mt. Lassen Volcanic National Park: Snow newly fallen up to Thursday has been melted by warm rain, leaving only four inches of wet snow on the ground surface. The rain continues, accompanied by a...

Under these conditions, there is of

course no skating on either Manzanita or Reflection lakes. The highway is open to two-way traffic and chains are advised. At 8 o'clock Friday morning, the temperature was 34 degrees, maximum for the past 24 hours having been 42 degrees and minimum for that period 33 degrees.

Table Mountain in Lassen National Forest: There are good two-way traffic conditions to this area, but chains are advised. Snow depth is nine inches, the top two inches consisting of new, wet snow. Thursday's report recorded temperatures varying from a maximum of 37 degrees to a minimum of 23 degrees, a gentle south wind, and cloudy skies.

There are five inches of new snow on the Klamath Falls to Bend highway, and a snow depth of 84 inches on the summit of Sun mountain. From the summit northward to Bend for a distance of nine miles, the road is slushy. At the town of Bend, Friday morning's temperature was 18 degrees, and a light rain was falling.

Klamath Falls to Lakeview, Klamath Falls to Weed, and the Tulelake to Monument roads are clear of snow and in good condition. A light rain was falling at Lakeview today.

The Greensprings highway is still clear of snow.

There are one and one-half inches of new snow at the summit of the Santiam Pass. Roads are packed with snow and this morning's rain has created an icy surface. Chains should be carried.

On the South Santiam, the 10 miles of new grade between Cascade and the Santiam junction are soft and muddy. Slide and fill settlement conditions reported last Friday have not improved. The highway is closed to heavy traffic seven miles east of Cascade. Chains are needed.

There is a half inch of new snow on the Mt. Hood Loop, bringing the total depth to 15 inches. There is packed snow on the highway in the vicinity of Government Camp for 25 miles. On Route 35, Government Camp to Hood River, there is packed snow on the highway from Parkdale to Government Camp.

The Willamette and McKenzie passes are closed for the winter. Latest news on snow, road, and weather conditions at your favorite sports areas in the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland is brought to you every Friday during the snow sports season by the United States department of agriculture, soil conservation service, in cooperation with the United States forest service, park service, weather bureau, and other federal and state agencies.
