GIGANTIC CAKE TO BE CUT AT BIRTHDAY BALL

A huge birthday cake, replete with all the decorations known to the hand of the fanciest cake baker, will be cut Saturday night in the Klamath Falls armory when several thousand persons are expected to attend the president's birthday ball. The cake is presented to the birthday ball committee by Fred Hogsland of Fluhrer's bakery.

The cake will go into the bakery oven Saturday morning and at least three pastry chefs are expected to lend a hand icing, decorating and putting final touches to the glamorous cake which will be served at the ball. Samuel P. Miller, chairman of the ball, reported ticket sales were excellent and anticipated Klamath Falls would top last year's receipts by several hundred dollars.

"Klamath county should realize that 50 per cent of the money taken in at the dance and in the advance sale of tickets remains in this county and is for the use of infantile paralysis victims," Miller pointed out. "The remaining 50 per cent goes to the national foundation for the study, prevention and cure of the dread disease which can hit in any home regardless of social standing, financial status, race or creed."

"As a community we must fight infantile paralysis, a disease which maims and cripples where it strikes unless there are adequate funds to fight it. I hope that every man and woman in the county will aid the infantile paralysis committee in putting over the president's ball with a bang," Miller said.

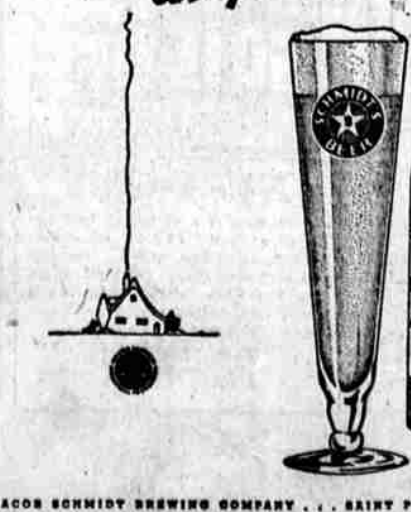
