CRATER DEVELOPMENT AIDED BY CLUB DRIVE

When the Klamath chapter of the Crater Lake Ski club starts its membership drive with a kickoff breakfast Tuesday morning, the town will be canvassed for \$1 subscriptions to a cause in which all winter sports fans should take great interest.

It may be just "handing out another buck" to many, but to those interested in the development of a potential southern Oregon Sun valley, the membership holds much in store.

Beginning Tuesday ski club members will start a drive picking up memberships into the organization. The tax is one dollar per head. The club is open to everyone, skiers and non-skiers, and the purpose of the membership drive is not so much to swell the active membership roster as to gain funds for the development of winter sports facilities at the lake.

The cards will entitle subscribers to use the new electric ski tow under construction for installation this winter on the steep slopes of Knob Hill. The lift will carry skiers more than a thousand feet and will be a great improvement over makeshift lifts that have been used in the past. Cost of the project is approximately \$1000.

Response to the club's drive for funds may mean additional developments in the near future for the ski center. The attendance has increased each weekend since the start of heavy snowfalls and more than a thousand skiers should visit the lake this Saturday and Sunday.

The area shows promise of becoming one of the most popular winter sports centers in the state. Here's what Ed Bell, chairman of the membership drive, has to say on the development possibilities:

"Crater lake is on the verge of major development in winter sports. It is not unlikely that in future seasons special snow trains will be running to Klamath Falls to accommodate ski fans from all parts of Oregon and northern California. The perfect snow conditions which exist at the lake provide a great tourist attraction."

DUTCH'S CREW TAKES OPENER IN DISTRICT SUB-PLAYOFF

Dutch French's revised Pellean basketball quintet, serving notice that its early season case of fitters is a thing of the past, walloped a strong Lakeview high basketball team at Lakeview Friday night, 37 to 16.

For the third successive game in as many starts on the varsity lineup, Virgil Jarrett piled up the evening's top score, ending the contest with an all-game high of 12 points. He was also high point man in last weekend's contests with Bend and Redmond.

The victory gives the Pelicans a one-game edge in the sub-district playoffs. They meet Lakeview in a two-out-of-three game series to determine the representative in the district playoffs against Bend.

The Pelicans took command from the opening whistle, running up a 13-6 margin at the end of the first quarter and staying in front 18-12 at the halftime recess.

During the third quarter the Pelicans, hitting the hoop from all angles, swelled their margin to 29-14, holding the Honkers to two points during the period. A two-point gain was also all the locals allowed the highly-rated Lakeview five during the final quarter.

Coach Dutch French ran his entire squad onto the floor and Lakeview also substituted freely. The game was harder fought than the score indicates, according to the Klamath mentor, who said both teams set a whirlwind pace that kept the fans on edge until the last basket whirled through the hoop.

The Honker quintet, termed the best team ever produced at Lakeview high school, seemed outclassed by the Pelicans, who hit the hoop with surprising regularity in a complete reversal of their shaky early season form. The Pelicans found the mark from freak positions and bottled up the Honkers with an effective defense.

Lowe, Klamath guard, was second high point man, with eight, followed by Erlanson of the locals and Wes Dollard of the Lakeview team, each with six.

Dollarhide was the standout of the Lakeview quintet and H. Lovenburg played a good defensive game, also accounting for many of the Honker scores on feeder plays.

The amateurs, paced by national Champion Marvin (Bud) Ward, compete on a best-ball basis with a professional. The pro in the winning twosome gets \$300, the amateur, a handsome trophy.

Weyerhaeuser's casaba quintet remained undefeated Friday night at the armory court, but it was only after a hard-fought battle with an underdog First National Bank that the Timbermen emerged victors, 40-34.

Playing without the services of their captain and floor general, Howard Scroggin, incapacitated by the flu, the Bankers put up stubborn resistance to a Weyerhaeuser win throughout the contest. The winners were barely able to stay four to six points in the lead at any time except once in the first half when the tally favored the timber crew 19-8.

With but two minutes remaining in the first period and trailing by 11 counters, First National turned on the steam for four baskets in quick succession while holding their opponents scoreless. Result was that the Weyerhaeuserites led only 19-16 at the intermission. The bank five continued the assault as the second session opened and took over the lead, 20-19, for a brief period. Captain Cliff McLean's boys, however, got back in the ball game and soon had a 27-22 lead again.

Glen Jones, erstwhile substitute for First National, whose sparkling goal shooting kept his team from lagging behind the Weyerhaeuser team, refused to be checked and as he poured in three more buckets three of his teammates helped with one apiece, the Bankers pulled up to within two points with two minutes to play. McLean tossed in a long one and Emil Strotheide and Buck Ferguson each contributed another in the last moments of the fray to give the winners a 40-34 final advantage.

The win marked Weyerhaeuser's sixth straight in league play while the losers now are tied for third spot with four victories and two losses. Molator's Cafe rests in second position with five wins in six starts.

A few way manufactured 49 points in Friday's opener against Webb Kennett's cagers and posted its second win of the year, 49-27. The game was fairly close during the first few minutes, but the Grocers held a 23-11 lead at the rest period.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 27 (AP)—The University of Oregon defeated the University of Washington 53-44 last night in the first of two Pacific Coast conference games. The win boosted Oregon into second place in the league standings.

Oregon led at halftime 27-25. Oregon held command nearly the entire game, but Washington threatened in the closing minutes of the first half and twice came within three points of the Web-footers in the second period.

The defending champions built a substantial 19-8 lead during the first eight minutes of the game, but three successive field goals by Bob Voelker, Husky guard, helped Washington close the gap to 25-19 with three minutes left. Schlichting and Jack Voelker led the drive that brought Washington to within two points of Oregon at the rest period.

Coach Howard Hobson's team kept its scoring pace in the second half and was safely ahead except twice when the scores were 39-36 and 42-39.

John Dick, Oregon center, scored nine field goals for high honors with 20 points. Schlichting, reserve Washington forward, led the invaders with 12. Although only 22 fouls were called, Dick and Andrews of Oregon and Bob Voelker of Washington were put out of the game with four each.

LANDIS SEEKS REMOVAL OF 'CHAIN STORE' IN BASEBALL

CHICAGO, Jan. 27 (UP)—Baseball Commissioner K. M. Landis today recommended sweeping changes in baseball law which would eliminate the chain store system within four years after their adoption by the major and minor leagues.

The determined commissioner, whose recent decisions against the Detroit Tigers brought protests that minor league baseball would collapse without the farm system, offered a constructive substitute financed by subsidies from the 16 major league clubs.

Here's what he'd do:
1. Eliminate all working agreements between major and minor league clubs. (A player may be assigned to another club outright only for an agreed consideration and before a specified date, after which the player will be subject to draft by higher clubs as under present rules.)

2. A player may be signed for present services only, not for anticipated future needs. (This would eliminate optional agreements, permitting a player to advance to clubs of higher classification as rapidly as he develops. Thus he could not be held back until the parent club needed him—perhaps for several seasons.)

3. All clubs of class B, C, and D would be granted subsidies and receive in addition all payments for sale or draft of player contracts after reimbursement of the subsidy.

The 16 major league clubs presumably would advance the subsidy and make up any deficit with equal contributions.

DURHAM, N. C., Jan. 27 (UP)—President W. G. Branham of the National Association of Minor Leagues today asked Commissioner K. M. Landis to suspend prohibitions against phases of baseball's farm system contained in Landis' seven-point bulletin issued January 15.

Since release of the bulletin, Branham said, major and minor leagues have been puzzled as to their farm operations for the coming season. He said his request would relieve the condition for 1940 and enable both majors and minors to work out suitable substitute farm plans which would meet Landis' approval.
