

LOCAL WOMAN OFFICER FOR GIRL SCOUTS

Coming as a distinctive honor to Klamath Falls is the appointment of Mrs. J. Percy Wells as a member of the regional committee of Girl Scouting. This committee serves as a promotion group in the Big Tree region which includes California, Oregon, Washington, Hawaii and the Philippine Islands.

PLANS DRAWN FOR SKI CLUB DRIVE

Final plans have been drawn for the membership drive of the Klamath Falls chapter of the Crater Lake Ski Club. E. J. Bell, chairman of the campaign, has announced that a kick-off breakfast will start the ball rolling on Tuesday morning of next week at which time the various districts of the city will be covered by teams of two persons each. It is anticipated that the drive will meet with a warm response as public interest in skiing has reached an all-time high locally as well as nationally.

Memberships in the Crater Lake Ski Club will be sold this year for \$1 each. It is pointed out that this low membership fee is unusually attractive this year because of the fact that the purchaser will be entitled to ride free of charge on the new electric ski lift that is being rushed to completion and that will be installed in Crater Lake park within the near future.

A feature of the Crater Lake Ski Club is that special attention is being given to the development of the skier who is new to the sport. The installation of the electric ski lift, which is being made at a cost of \$1000, will be done in such a manner that the novice skier will find it very easy to ride upon. Ski runs available from the top of the ski lift will offer a variety ranging from a very low angle run for beginners to high speed runs for experts. All ski runs from the top of the lift will terminate in the ski bowl just below the lodge. This ski bowl is fast coming to be recognized as one of the finest snow playfields in the northwest.

It is pointed out by Embert Fossum, president of the local chapter of the Crater Lake Ski Club, that the development of winter sports in the Crater lake area is a project worthy of the support of the entire community. It is anticipated that as the unusually fine winter sports conditions at Crater lake become better known it will result in a greatly increased winter tourist travel into this area.

NEW SNOW FALLS AT CRATER LAKE

Five inches of new snow fell at Crater Lake national park during the night, bringing the depth on the level to 71 inches, according to Carlisle Crouch, chief ranger.

Ski sink in between five and eight inches, Crouch stated, and the snow is of the soft, medium type. Roads are plowed out in good shape.

Maximum temperature at the park was 31 degrees, minimum, 27 degrees.

Crouch stated there was no snow Saturday morning at Union creek and the road is open from that point by way of Diamond lake to The Dalles-California highway.

All weekend accommodations at government headquarters were taken by Saturday night, Crouch stated.
