JANUARY HEAT NEARS RECORD AS FLOWERS SPROUT

Unless Tuesday and Wednesday take a decided nose dive down the thermometer, the month of January bids fair to be one of the warmest in the history of Klamath county weather records, according to E. Laton Stephens, associate engineer of the US bureau of reclamation.

It was slightly warmer back in January, 1934, Stephens reported, and the succeeding February was also a warm, balmy month.

Sunday saw restless gardeners working in their yards while the temperature soared to 55 degrees, warmest day since December 3, 1939. Daffodils, hyacinths, tulips and other bulbs are pushing their way through ground which is soft and moist. Robins and pelicans are in evidence and it looks like an early spring from nature's standpoint.

KLAMATH PIONEER DIES AT YACHTS

Word of the death of Charles Wesley Craig in Yachats, Ore., January 24, has been received in Klamath Falls.

Mr. Craig is survived by the following children: R. D. Craig of Klamath Falls, Mrs. Cora Palmer of Yachats, Ore., Walter Craig and Mrs. Viola Christy of Grants Pass, Irvin W. Craig and Mrs. Ethel Lazott and Mrs. Mary Smith of Fresno, Calif., Gladys Tripp of Oakland, Calif. In addition 43 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren survive.

Mr. Craig was an Oregon pioneer. He was born March 10, 1853, in Covington, Ind. He was 86 years, 10 months and 14 days at the time of his death. He married Sarah L. Miller April 21, 1880, at Grant City, Mo. Mrs. Craig died in May, 1932.

In 1881 the Craigs left Sandburg, Ind., arriving in Portland June 4. They resided until November of that year in Portland when they left over the Old Oregon trail coming through Linkville, now Klamath Falls, over the mountains through Jacksonville and down the Illinois river where they finally settled in Deer Creek valley, 27 miles west of Grants Pass. Of late years Mr. Craig had made his home in Medford. For the last few months he has been visiting his children. Twelve children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Craig, eight of whom are still living.

Seats are still available for the St. Olaf choir concert which will be given at the Pelican theatre Wednesday night at 8:15 o'clock. It was announced Monday by Rev. L. K. Johnson, pastor of the Klamath Lutheran church which is sponsoring the appearance of the famous choir here.

Ticket holders are urged to have their seats reserved early. The Pelican theatre ticket window will remain open continuously from early afternoon until evening, it is understood.

While they have long since accepted it as one of the really great units of the musical world, critics are still trying to explain the technical perfection and spiritual sublimity achieved by the St. Olaf choir.

To the world in general it is incredible that a small denominational college in Minnesota should produce a choral body which delivers, in the most finished form imaginable, the most difficult scores ever composed for a cappella singing.

A visit to the college itself, with the opportunity of learning something of its history, probably would furnish the best key to the mystery—if it can be called a mystery.

St. Olaf college was founded 65 years ago by Norwegian emigrants who were willing to undergo any sacrifice in order that their sons and daughters might learn to link the ideas of religion and education with those of political freedom. The original outlay, modest as it was, represented the sternest, barest self-denial on the part of the founders, and the subsequent history of the institution has been a record of continued sacrifice.

In general, the students are members of families blessed with only modest means. Their sons and daughters go to college because it is considered a high privilege—not a social stunt. Everything about the simplicity of college life is calculated to impress them with the value of individual effort, the necessity for work, and the importance of the inner life as contrasted with physical luxury.

This spirit cannot fail to express itself in all departments, and nowhere is it felt more deeply than in the singing of the youthful chorists.
