NEW YORK, Jan. 30 (AP)—Leading stocks weakened for a while in today's market but most cut extreme losses in the closing hour.

Setbacks ran to a point or so for steels, motors, aircrafts and specialties in the forenoon. There were a few declines of four or so on small turnovers.

Comparative steadiness of rails, utilities, coppers and oils helped attract mild support for other groups at the close. A few modest gains occurred near the end.

The pace was sluggish with transfers in the neighborhood of 550,000 shares.

Well down the greater portion of the day were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, Westinghouse, Du Pont, Allied Chemical and Brooklyn-Manhattan Transit. J. I. Case shed five points before getting aid.

WHEAT DIPS, MAKES CLOSING RECOVERY

CHICAGO, Jan. 30 (AP)—Wheat prices were 3-4 cent lower at one stage today but all of this loss was recovered before the close. The lowest prices in more than six weeks were recorded early in the session.

Selling inspired by moderating weather, melting snow and more favorable crop reports from the winter wheat belt accounted for most of the early decline. On the other hand, there was considerable buying to even up accounts later in the session, with most traders awaiting the Hitler speech. Moderate purchasing was credited to mills.

Wheat closed 3c to 4c higher compared with yesterday's finish. May 97-97 1/2c, July 94-94 1/2c, corn 54-54 1/2c, soybeans 54-54 1/2c, oats unchanged to 4c lower.

WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, Jan. 30 (AP-USA)—Only a few scattered sales were reported on domestic wools in the Boston market today. The prices realized in these sales indicate a downward trend in prices as some holders sought to move wools despite the wide-spread lack of interest on the part of users. Good French combing length fine territory wools in original bags were sold at 95 to 97 cents scoured basis. Graded, combed three-eighths blood, bright fleece wool was sold at about 42 to 43 cents in the grease.
