BOBBY ROWE'S AGENT EYES HOCKEY, RACES

Klamath Falls may soon find itself fitted out with a midwest auto race track and an ice coliseum, if things here look favorable enough to Paul Ail, manager and vice president of Bobby Rowe, Inc. He arrived Monday afternoon to give the town a once-over for the two projects of the Portland amusement concern.

The representative of the Portland corporation made no definite statement Monday evening after a preliminary examination, but announced that before he left Tuesday he would have a definite "yes" or "no."

All is making a swing through the state, visiting Astoria, Newport, Medford, Klamath Falls and Bend. He announced that plans have definitely been made to install a midwest auto race track at Medford, and seemed fairly certain that conditions here would merit the installation of another track.

Last year at Bend, on the Fourth of July, Bobby Rowe's midwest auto races took the public eye to such an extent that one single gate amounted to \$1900.

The sport would be something entirely new to Klamath, but its popularity has been proved in the east and in the northwest. Rowe manages the tracks at Jantzen Beach, the Union Avenue speedway at Portland, Oregon City, the Seattle Midway track, the Seattle Aurora speedway and at Vancouver.

He reports that races of the dwarf cars have a tremendous drawing power, resulting in the installation of 2000 new seats at the Jantzen Beach track to accommodate the crowds.

All was busy Monday night and Tuesday morning contacting various Klamath businessmen and officials. He indicated that the county fairgrounds offered a possibility. Should that spot be picked, the 270-180 foot area necessary for the construction of a track would be rented from the county.

All declined to make a definite statement on ice hockey until after the completion of his investigation, but said that he was "concentrating" on the ice sport.

His conversation indicated that favorable reports about the interest displayed here in skating had reached Bobby Rowe's ears. All admitted that installation of an ice coliseum might mean the organization of a Coast league hockey team for Klamath Falls.

Struttin' Danny's Daschen

Why they call Danny McShain "Struttin' Danny" is easily conceived when you see him walking along a street. He not only struts, he swaggers. And entirely befitting his Esquimaux get-up is the chocolate-colored Daschen he leads on the end of a string.

He's somewhat boastful of the many times he's been injured in the ring, enumerating one broken right shoulder, two breaks for his left shoulder, a broken jaw, broken hands, and several other lesser ailments suffered since he started wrestling at the age of 14.

He won the world lightweight belt three years ago from Red Berry at the Hollywood Legion stadium.

PRINCE FACES MONTGOMERY, NEGRO BILLED WITH RUFFIAN

World Champ Danny McShain, the struttin' kingly of light-weight grapplers, will tangle with an old favorite of Klamath mat fans tonight at the armory when he clambers into the ring against Cowboy Dude Chick of Wyoming.

The Wyoming whirler, who once held a world wrestling title himself, is far out in front of the Hollywood braggart in popularity, and many fans contend that tonight's match will see the cowboy thoroughly wallop his lighter opponent.

Chick, master of the airplane spin, has agreed to come into the ring at 195 pounds, after weighing in with Dr. Paul Sharp, boxing commission physician.

McShain, at 184, will be at a slight disadvantage as to weight, but he handled the husky King Kong Clayton last week and convinced the spectators that airdupolis has very little to do with the outcome of the bout when he's concerned.

McShain, whose specialty is the piledriver, one of the most dangerous maneuvers in the game, counts largely on speed for his mat victories, and on quick thinking.

"The trouble with Clayton last week," Danny said, "was that the negro thinks well, and logically, but just a bit too slow." Although outweighed by many pounds, the champ wrestled circles around the popular dandy.

But in Chick he will find an equal in brain power as well as in physical skill. Cowboy Dude is noted as an old timer, with the caginess that comes with experience of many years in the business.

In the other two bouts King Kong Clayton will tangle with Joe Smolinski, Polish grappler, and Bob Montgomery of Georgia will be paired against Prince Nihalakis.

A coin is to be tossed by the management to determine which bout is staged as the opener. The card presents six grapplers any one of whom is worthy of a spot on a top main event.

The Smolinski-Clayton feud should provide an interesting brand of wrestling. Clayton is a clean grappler, while the Pole, thoroughly disliked hereabouts, knows no limits as to unorthodox grappling.

Prince Nihalakis, popular Arabian who wrestled Smolinski in a colorful bout last week, will meet one of the roughest foes he has yet come up against when he tangles with Montgomery in the other half of the double opening card.

The gong sounds at 8:30 sharp.

Two of the best barnstorming professional basketball teams in the country, the House of David quintet of Benton Harbor, Mich., and the Broadway Clowns of Harlem, N. Y., will headline the hoop program billed Thursday night at the Klamath Armory. Two regular Klamath Basin league contests will precede the feature attraction making this one of the finest shows of casaba play ever staged on the local arena.

When two teams accustomed to winning better than 90 per cent of their games meet each other something is bound to pop and it appears that just that kind of an explosion will occur Thursday night as these two clubs renew their two-year-old feud. The Davids won both games from the Clowns, 56-53 two years ago, and 28-27 last winter.

Both the pro teams are noted for their comedy on the floor, but that receives its fullest position of an inferior order and need not be pressed too hard to achieve victory. In previous exhibitions here both groups of these touring court artists have given laughter-producing entertainments of hoop action that has kept the audience in a constant uproar.

When they tackle each other, on the other hand, it's a different story. Horseplay and court antics have to be put aside in favor of the serious business of trying to pull ahead. And despite their best efforts it is difficult for either squad to gain more than a four or five point margin at any time during the encounter.

BEAVERS WHIP HUSKY CAGERS 45-26 AFTER WOBBLY START

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 30 (UP)—Oregon State college staged a red hot scoring rally in the second half to defeat the University of Washington 45-26 in a northern division Pacific coast basketball conference game last night.

Washington led at halftime 15-13.

The victory strengthened Oregon State's hold on first place in conference standings. The teams play again tonight.

Trailing at the end of a slow half, the staters came back in the final period with an excellent display of passing and shooting that tied the score at 17-all within a minute and a half, and gave them a 12-point lead after two minutes.

Al Hunter, who made 9 of his 10 points in the final period, and Paul Valenti, who scored all of his 7 in that period, led the Beaver attack.

Washington's running attack was slowed down by Oregon State who varied its offensive between set plays and a fast break.

The Huskies made only four field goals each half on 49 tries. The Beavers made only three goals in the first period after missing many setups, but their eyes were steadier in the final period and the final count gave them 13 goals out of 45 attempts.

Joe Gordon May Ask Pay Boost

EUGENE, Jan. 30 (P)—Joe Gordon, New York Yankee second baseman, was busy with his horses and dogs at his new suburban residence southwest of here this morning when interrupted from his chores by the toot of the rural postman's whistle. It marked the arrival of his 1940 contract from the Yankee management.

The youthful infield star who was recently credited with much of the success of the World and American league champions by Babe Ruth, looked over the document and then announced that he would keep it around the house for a few days and then send it back to New York—unsigned.

The former University of Oregon football and baseball star was unable to divulge the figure included in the letter because of a ruling of the Yankee management forbidding the naming of salary figures. He did say, however, "I'm not holdout, but I do think I'll write a note with the return of the document and see if I can't have the salary item boosted."

Close friends believed the contract offered Gordon a slight increase over the \$10,000 salary received last season, and that he would ask for a substantial increase.

The boxing writers had been forewarned Campolo was a slow starter, but they didn't expect that it would require nine rounds for him to get under way. Particularly if Manager Jimmy Johnson was grooming him for Brown Bomber Louis, who loves slow starters.

Campolo, who weighed 224, stands six feet, four inches, 160 lbs., no pimpy himself, stood six feet, three inches and weighed 218 pounds.

Robinson, who was stopped at the end of three rounds a couple of weeks ago by Lee Savold at Madison Square garden, carried the fight to this imported "white hope" during most of the milling.

In the very first round one of Robinson's long right jolts cut a gash on the inside of Campolo's left eye. And Big Jim shook up the Argentine time and again with straight left jabs to the face and long-range rights to the head.

Robinson actually staggered Campolo in the sixth round with a smacking right to the button that knocked the invader into the ropes.

But Valentin, completely game, though somewhat amateurish, fought himself out of trouble.

Throughout the engagement Campolo showed his most formidable weapon was a left hook, to the body primarily, and also to the head. It was this blow that nailed Robinson in the ninth and put him down for the count of eight, then kept plumping into Robinson's face like a trip-hammer as Big Jim was driven to the ropes and stood there away helplessly while that brutal left battered into his unprotected face.

From there he watched his style more carefully for the remaining rounds and circled more adroitly to Mello's right. He evaded further knockdowns and managed to win the split 12-round decision, after putting Bettina on the floor in the 10th. The fight was so thrilling, so close and so widely disputed Promoter Jacobs decided to throw them into the ring again.

CAMPOLO WINS ROBINSON GO BY TECHNICAL IN 9TH ROUND

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 30 (UP)—Valentin Campolo of Argentina, reportedly another "wild bull of the pampas," made a questionable United States debut last night by scoring a technical knockout over Jim Robinson of Philadelphia in the ninth round at Laurel gardens.

Campolo, the Argentine giant who launched his North American campaign in the same club where Luis Angel Firpo was unveiled 18 years ago, stopped Robinson at 1:25 of the ninth round, after flooring him in that session for a count of nine.

Referee Paul Cavalier interfered because Robinson was helpless and battered on the ropes.

Campolo won on a knyp, but his showing was so unimpressive in the preceding rounds he probably never would be considered as cannon fodder for Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis.

In the eight rounds preceding the knyp, Robinson was well ahead according to the United Press scoring. Big Jim had won five heats against two for the Latin invader, and the seventh was even.
