NOT A MOTION PICTURE

EGGS TAKEN FROM BROOD TROUT FOR OREGON STREAMS

Approximately 1,219,345 eggs have been taken to date by the state game department from less than 20,000 adult native searun cutthroat trout held at the Alsea trout hatchery. This supply of brood trout, the only one of its kind in Oregon, has been developed through careful selection and was recently reported by Dr. Fred J. Foster, regional director of the U. S. bureau of fisheries, to be the largest and finest stock of adult native cutthroat trout in existence.

The commission plans to rear cutthroat brood trout at the Alsea hatchery for the purpose of stocking local lakes in Douglas and Coos counties, which is being acquired for development as a cutthroat brood lake and from which it is hoped that it will eventually be possible to secure enough eggs to supply the needs of the coast hatcheries.

FSA, FFA LEADERS MEET AT REDMOND FEBRUARY 5 AND 6

A district conference of farm security administration officials, Smith-Hughes instructors, and members of the extension service, will be held Monday and Tuesday, February 5 and 6, in Redmond, Ore. It was announced this week.

Street, George Shambrook and Arthur Cole, Smith-Hughes men, will attend as will C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agricultural agent, and C. C. Jenkins, 4-H club agent.
