STOCKS FAIL TO CLIMB ON RAGGED BIDS

NEW YORK, Jan. 31 (AP)—Stocks struggled inconclusively today with the problem of lifting themselves by their own bootstraps—and got nowhere.

Approaching the close, the general level was just about that of yesterday with shares changing hands at a rate approximating only 650,000 shares.

For an hour or so, averages crawled upward gradually—for no particular reason, then they declined—with just as much cause.

The day's outstanding performers were Loft and Studebaker, which touched new highs for 1939-40, and Bigelow-Sanford, which for a time was up more than a point following an exceptionally good earnings report.

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WHEAT SLIDES OFF IN IRREGULAR DAY

CHICAGO, Jan. 31 (AP)—Wheat prices moved irregularly within a narrow range today and after gaining 1/4 cent fell as much as 1/2 cent a bushel under the previous close.

Lack of follow through buying on a brief, moderate upturn that carried May contracts to 97 1/2 c, and failure of Winnipeg to maintain early advances caused the decline from the day's best levels. May contracts fell to 96 1/4 c, down 1/2 c from the previous close.

Wheat finished 1/4 c under yesterday's close, May 96 1/4 c, July 93 1/4 c; corn 1/2 c down, May 55 1/2 c, July 55 1/2 c; oats 1/4 c higher.

DOUGLAS COUNTY BOASTS OF VALUE OF FIR TIMBER

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 31 (AP)—Presenting the claim that "the future of the northwest lumber industry lies in southern Oregon," the industries committee of the Roseburg chamber of commerce this week is mailing to all principal lumber firms of the Pacific Northwest a letter calling attention to Douglas county's timber inventory. The letter, designed to encourage investment in lumbering operations, points out that nearly 30 per cent of all the remaining Douglas fir timber in the United States is in Douglas county lying principally within a 50-mile radius of Roseburg.

Attention is called to the timber inventory, showing 70 billion board feet of timber of all varieties, and an annual growth of 730 million feet, board measure, as compared with the present rate of cutting, which is less than 100 million feet annually.

INCREASE IN WOOD PRODUCTS RATE SET

SEATTLE, Jan. 31 (AP)—An increase in shipping rates on three Pacific Northwest wood products to the east, effective February 15, was announced today by the Intercoastal Steamship Freight association. The association said the tariff on lumber will be increased from \$14 per thousand to \$15, shingles from 70 cents per hundredweight to 73 and pulp from 35 cents per hundredweight to 37 1/2. The rate on flour will be advanced from 35 to 40 cents per hundredweight on March 1.

COAST GRID RULES RAPPED AT SAN JOSE

SAN JOSE, Calif., Jan. 31 (AP)—Dr. T. W. MacQuarrie, president of San Jose State college, renewed his attack on the Pacific Coast athletic conference today and charged the present "purification" campaign in collegiate football circles would restrict football playing to sons of rich parents.

Writing in his column in the Spartan Daily, Dr. MacQuarrie said:

"The present move in the Pacific Coast conference seems to mean only the sons of well-to-do parents will have a chance to play football. If a player from a family in ordinary circumstances appears on one of those teams, you can make up your mind the great ethical balloon has burst."

"You can be very sure somewhere, somehow, the money has been provided to keep that player in college, support him in a manner to which he has never been accustomed, and assure to his alma mater a son who can advance the ball as an alumnus of one of the coast conference schools."

The eight big schools of the Pacific Coast conference recently announced they would eliminate prospecting of football players and set up machinery for regulation of the sport. San Jose State college's football team, coached by Glenn (Pop) Warner and Dud DeGroff, have been top scorers in the nation for two years. Since 1935 San Jose has operated on a policy of providing its athletes with board and room with the proviso they use for study the time they otherwise would devote to earn their keep.
