## JANUARY FAILS TO BREAK 1934 HEAT RECORDS

Records kept by the US bureau of reclamation say that 1934's January was warmer by a couple of degrees, and there is a hint that 1907 was a bit on the warm side as well.

There were five clear days during the month, 14 which were partly cloudy, and 12 cloudy days.

Checking back the records the past month was 7.2 degrees above normal. In 1934 mean maximum for the month of January was 56.9 degrees; maximum 59 degrees, and minimum, 49 degrees.

LA GRANDE, Feb. 1 (P)—Police Chief Frank B. Osmond held Robert Hall, 60, in the city jail today in connection with the shooting of Mrs. Eva Mann, 51, and her son, Charles Kirkwood, 21, during a dispute over an impaired electric light.

Hospital attendants said Kirkwood's condition was critical. Mrs. Mann, Hall's housekeeper, required hospitalization but was not believed seriously wounded.

Chief Osmond quoted Hall as saying the shooting occurred after he found his bedroom light would not turn on.

## JAPAN SEEKING FUNDS TO KEEP EYE ON SOVIET

Hachiro Arita, foreign minister, who expressed Japan's hope of putting her trade relations with the United States back on a treaty basis.

Hata said illegal Russian acts had occurred on borders other than the disputed frontier between Manchukuo and outer Mongolia.

The foreign office, meanwhile, issued a brief communique on the breakdown of Russian-Japanese negotiations at Harbin, Manchukuo, reporting that the mixed boundary commission had decided to adjourn and leave the question of demarcation "to be decided at a later date." A total of 16 meetings had left the conference still in disagreement.

Arita's address, the annual foreign minister's report at the opening session of the diet (parliament), canvassed the whole range of Japan's international relations. Unlike last year, when the diet applauded wildly over plans for Japan's "new order" in east Asia, Arita's summary was met with dead silence.

"It seems to me the existence of a minister who would be the dictator over all (economic) departments the right honorable member described would change the position of the prime minister and I do not see what the prime minister would have left to do by the time this gentleman had given his orders to all departments."

According to word received here the 20-30 club of Bend sponsored the president's ball in the Elks temple. Said the Bend Bulletin: "During an intermission a huge birthday cake, 'three stories tall,' is to be cut by Mrs. Katherine G. Nelson, supervisor in charge of the Bend census district."

two weeks after the negotiations came to a standstill "the soviet government unilaterally violated every agreement concluded with Finland and invaded our country."

Dispatches to Finnish newspapers from Tallinn tended to support previous reports that the Finnish air forces had inflicted heavy damages on soviet air bases in Estonia.

These reports said the Estonian government, which granted Russia extensive military rights last October, had announced several bombs were dropped on Estonian soil by a fleet of 34 Finnish warplanes Tuesday.

Finland reported the forays without giving details.

Reval dispatches said that the soviet air base at Baltiaki was taken completely by surprise and that several hangars and planes were destroyed. Now Russia has ordered all important bases and cities in Estonia blacked out at night, it was said.

The president praised the unanimity of the diet and government and said "A more harmonious page has surely never before been written in the history of the Finnish parliament."

"We who are primarily responsible before the nation and before history for the decisions we have made, as well as 'have had an unshakable inner conviction that the heart of the people in defense of our rights has beaten in time with ours.'"

He closed with a prayer for Finland.

Another Klamath county pioneer died this week it was learned — the word of the passing of John Henry Peatross, 54, long time resident of Langell valley, reached Klamath Falls.

Mr. Peatross died in St. Mary's hospital, San Francisco, and burial took place in the bay city. Cause of death was attributed to an old axe wound in the leg which later developed into blood poisoning. He had been under treatment for some time before his death. He was interred in Holy Cross cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Alice Peatross, a son, J. C. Peatross, and a daughter, Mrs. Mae Gale.

Mr. Peatross was born in Sacramento, Calif., and at one time owned extensive orchards in and around that city. He first came to Klamath Falls in 1904 and started farming in the Langell valley district where for some time he served as ditch tender and watermaster.
