Five drunks, two charged with disorderly conduct, one with vagrancy, and another with being both drunk and disorderly appeared in police court Friday morning.

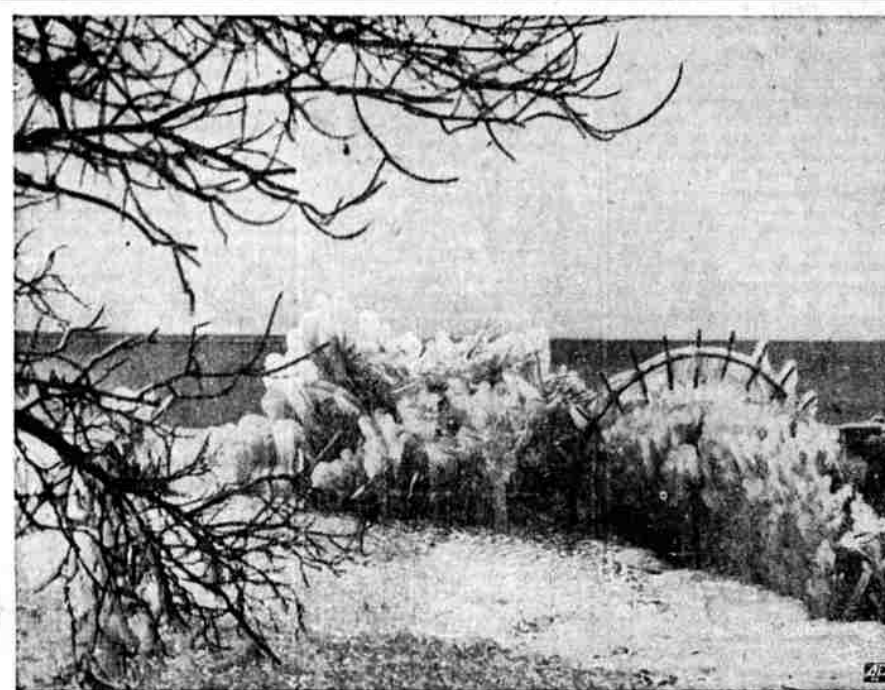

Once Dapper Captain Ends Five-Year Bigamy Sentence

AUBURN, N. Y., Feb. 2 (AP)—Dapper Captain Ivan Poderjay, shackled and wearing a smart tuxedo coat, emerged today from Auburn prison where he served five years for bigamous marriage to a bride who disappeared on her honeymoon.

The former Yugoslavian army officer held high his shackles as photographers met him at the big door of the jail's outer wall. His hat cocked over one eye, he was taken to the Cayuga county jail by Sheriff Willard Wilcox and Undersheriff Edward J. Ramsay where he will remain for three days to await deportation to Yugoslavia.

The captain, who lost his right eye in a fight with another prisoner two years ago, refused to answer questions concerning his missing bride, Agnes Colonia Tufverson, brilliant New York corporation lawyer.

Miss Tufverson, then 43 years old, resigned her job in 1933 to marry Captain Poderjay, International bon vivant. Asked about his future plans, the captain, who gave his age as 40, said he "didn't know what to do," and explained he was "physically unable" to take part in the European war.

At the county jail, he asserted he was "not married now," listed his occupation as "retired army captain and inventor," and acted: "Now a degraded captain."

He proudly displayed a scar and socks which he declared were knitted by "my wife." He declined to explain more exactly to whom he referred.

His marriage to Miss Tufverson took place in New York's Little Church Around the Corner and the obviously happy bride prepared for their European honeymoon.

Poderjay, at least, sailed. Agnes' sisters were mystified by her strange farewell telephone call the night of the sailing.

There was a cablegram from London, then silence. The bride's sisters, worried, stirred the New York missing persons bureau into activity.

It was discovered that nine months before his marriage to Miss Tufverson, Poderjay was married to a French blonde.

SNOWCAST

Crater Lake: The south and west entrance roads to this area, as well as the road to the rim, are all in good winter condition. The center of the roads are bare but the shoulders are icy in the morning and evening. Chains are not needed at this time, but it is well to consult the standard broadcasts of the U. S. weather bureau for possible changes in snow conditions before making the trip. No new snow has fallen since Wednesday and the total snow depth is now 60 inches. The surface is icy pack in the early morning and evening, softening during midday. At 8:00 o'clock Friday morning, the temperature was 30 degrees—maximum for the past 24 hours having been 50 degrees and minimum 26 degrees. The weather was cloudy, and a light, south wind was blowing. Overnight accommodations for this weekend are still available at park headquarters for five men and eight women. The park staff is maintaining parking space for several hundred cars, and the usual meal, warming room, and first aid facilities are available.

Diamond Lake: Highway 230 past Diamond lake is open, and since no new snow has fallen, chains are not needed. The total snow depth is six inches, the surface being a breakable crust which softens during the day. A south, light wind is blowing and skies are cloudy. Maximum temperature for the past 24 hours was 40 degrees, minimum 26 degrees, and temperature at 8 o'clock Friday morning was 30 degrees. The lake ice is topped by four inches of slush. Caution! Ice on the lake is dangerously thin and skating is not advised.

Lake of the Woods: The roads from Butte Falls and Astland to this area are closed. The road leading from Klamath Falls is passable but rough. Chains are advised. There are only five inches of wet snow and in some places the ground is bare. The weather is cloudy but calm, and no new snow has fallen. Temperature at time of reporting was 27 degrees, maximum for the past 24 hours having been 41 degrees. Skating is not advised as the ice on the lake is dangerously thin in spots.

Warner Canyon: The highway is open to two-way traffic and chains are not needed. No new snow has fallen and the total snow depth is ten inches. The snow surface is icy pack. A light southeast wind was blowing at time of reporting—6 p. m. Thursday. This area now has two ski lifts in operation—a 400-foot tow and a 1000-foot tow. There is parking space for over 400 cars. Short orders and warming room facilities are available.

Mt. Shasta-Sierra Alpine Lodge: The Everett-Memorial highway is open to a point four and one-half miles above Mt. Shasta City, but chains are advised. The total snow depth at Sierra Alpine Lodge is seven feet, topped with four inches of powder snow. Total snow depth at Sand Flat is 54 inches of normal pack snow topped with three inches of powder snow. This covering of powder snow at both places fell Wednesday. Temperature at 8 o'clock Friday morning at Mt. Shasta City was 43 degrees with the maximum for the previous 24 hours having been 60 degrees and the minimum 25 degrees. In the vicinity of Mt. Shasta City, skies were overcast, with fog in the valley, and southeast 2-miles-an-hour wind. There is no skating at Abrams lake.

Snowman's Hill: Still no snow in this area.

Mt. Lassen Volcanic National Park-Manzanita Lake: The highway to the Manzanita lake area is in good condition and open to two-way traffic. Chains are not needed but should be carried in case of storms. No new snow has fallen, and there are only patches of old snow, with a breakable crust. Temperature at 8 o'clock Friday morning was 34 degrees—maximum temperature for the past 24 hours was 45 degrees and minimum 31 degrees. Skies are overcast and a south, gentle wind is blowing. There is no skating or skiing. Table Mountain-Lassen National Forest: No skiing in this area.

The Greensprings highway, the Lava Beds road, and the highway leading from Klamath Falls to Lakeview, Alturas, and Weed are all clear of snow and in good condition.

No new snow has fallen on the highway between Klamath Falls and Bond and the road is clear. A section of the old surface between Modoc Point and the Williamson river is broken in patches, making the road rough.

The North Santiam road is clear of snow and in good condition.

On the South Santiam, the ten miles of new grade between Cascadia and Santiam Junction are soft and muddy. There are several narrow sections due to slides. Because of fill settlement, the highway 17 miles east of Cascadia is closed to all heavy traffic. Chains should be carried.

On the Wapinitia cut-off, there is packed snow on the road in the vicinity of Government Camp for about 14 miles. There are only six inches of snow in this area, no new snow having fallen during the week. Skies are overcast; temperature is 40 degrees.

On Route 35, Government Camp to Hold River, there are patches of packed snow on the road from Parkdale to Government Camp.
