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## THIRTEEN ENLIST AT LOCAL ARMY OFFICE

Thirteen men were enlisted in the army through the local recruiting office of Corporal Lester D. Norman during January. It was announced in a press release received today from Lieutenant Colonel H. D. Bagnall, Portland recruiting officer. The Portland recruiting district, which includes all of Oregon and several counties in Washington and Idaho, accomplished 283 enlistments during the month, the largest monthly enlistment total on record for the district.

Three local men were enlisted during the last week in January. They are: John C. Ayena, route 3, for the 63rd coast artillery, Fort MacArthur, Calif.; Howard D. Abbey, route 1, for the 76th field artillery, Presidio of Monterey, Calif.; and Fred L. Pankey, Chiloquin, for the air corps, Moffett field, Calif. Robert E. Greear, Chiloquin, is the first enlistment for February. He will serve in the air corps, Philippine Islands.

Restricted quotas for February will probably result in fewer enlistments this month than last, Colonel Bagnall said. He anticipates the suspension of air corps recruiting by the middle of February. If not sooner, because of the many men who have been entering that branch. The Klamath Falls office has replacement quotas for infantry, coast and field artillery, cavalry, medical department and quartermaster corps for several Pacific coast posts. Four men can be accepted here for infantry. Hawaii. A few infantrymen can be sent to Alaska.

## RUNAWAY COUPE CRASHES INTO TELEPHONE POLE

A Dodge coupe careened from Seventh and Washington streets down Seventh street hill at 8 o'clock Saturday morning, finally crashing into a telephone pole at the Fremont school, corner of Seventh and High streets.

Police officers said the coupe was owned by E. F. Duffy, 208 Alpha apartments, and it had been parked at the top of the hill.

## BURGLARY CHARGE DISMISSED; NEW COUNT DRAWS FINE

Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst Thursday dismissed a charge of burglary in a dwelling at night which had been brought against Velar Robert Hamm after an altercation early Sunday morning in the residence of L. F. Orrel, of Wocus flat. A new charge of being intoxicated in a private place was filed against him and he was sentenced to pay a fine of \$15 and \$7.20 costs.

A 60-day jail sentence was suspended, providing Hamm pay \$100 damages to Orrel's household property, which occurred, police said, when Hamm entered the house while intoxicated and smashed a table and two chairs.

## STATE INCOME TAX PAYMENTS ADVANCE

SALEM, Feb. 8 (AP)—Early 1940 state income tax collections are running ahead of those at this time last year. Tax Commissioner Earl Fisher said here today. The commission has received \$148,267 to date as against \$110,721 a year ago.

"But you can't tell much by early returns," the commissioner warned. The commission estimates it will receive at least \$5,100,000 from the income tax this year. Collections in 1939 aggregated \$4,615,000.

## CALIFORNIA MAKES CO-OP PLAN WORK

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 8 (AP)—The state of California wound up its first month in the retail grocery business today to the apparent satisfaction of almost everyone except its competitors. Definite figures on the first month's operations of the experimental consumers' co-operative store set up by the state relief administration for the benefit of its clients were not available.

George Keller, the manager, was optimistic, however, as he worked on his balance sheet while customers drifted in, made their selections from displays on conveniently arranged tables, bought a little fresh meat from the butcher and paid for their purchases out of their relief checks.

The customers were optimistic, too—hopeful that they would receive a part of their money back in the form of dividends from the profits of the store.

They confessed it was the potential dividends that made the arrangement attractive to them, although one, who said he had been manager of a farmers' co-operative in Wisconsin for six and a half years, declared he was a convert to the co-operative principle, profit or no profit.

Proprietors of nearby stores spoke just as feelingly—not of expected profits but of those they declared they saw slipping away from them since the new state store was established. They agreed they had lost trade steadily ever since the co-op was opened.

Keller, one of the two salaried

employees of the co-operative, estimated the first month's business at \$3400, which he said was \$400 better than had been expected. That amount of buying was done by some 700 or 800 families.

Other employees are relief clients, working at union wages long enough each month to earn the equivalent of 15 per cent of their relief checks.

A little more than half the merchandise is obtained from producers' co-operatives, and Keller said the percentage of co-operative produced merchandise is increasing. Most of it, as well

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as that bought from private sources, consists of the common staple necessities.
