

WEATHER DIET VARIED DURING DAY IN BASIN

A varied diet of rain, snow and hail fell throughout the Klamath basin Tuesday and added another credit to the already high precipitation for the stream year. Between 5 p. m. Sunday and 6 p. m. Monday, for the 24 hour period, a total of .27 inches of rain was recorded, and from that time to 8 a. m. Tuesday, a total of .11 inches was chalked up by the weather man.

Total precipitation for the stream year reached 9.06 inches as compared to the normal figure of 6.08 inches and 5.32 inches of last year.

Rain chased freezing temperatures from charts throughout Oregon Tuesday and virtually all points in the state recorded moisture. In North Bend on Coos Bay 1.49 inches of rain fell, and the heaviest rain in two years was recorded in the vicinity of Portland where several mud slides on the Columbia river highway were reported.

Traffic proceeded through high water on the west side Pacific highway between Corvallis and Monroe and almost one-half of an inch of rain was reported in Pendleton.

A minimum temperature of 39 degrees and a maximum of 48 degrees Tuesday lent a spring-like atmosphere to the Klamath country and it was more like April than February with intermittent showers, flooding rains of sunshine and flurries of rain-snow-hail combination.

Forecast for Tuesday night was additional showers with clearing skies Wednesday.
