WHEAT TURNS UP AT CLOSE OF DAY

CHICAGO, Feb. 6 (AP)—Wheat trade today followed the pattern of yesterday's session, easing early and then turning upward, the market scoring gains of as much as 1 1/2 cents in closing minutes.

Buying and short-covering was prompted by southwest reports of flour business and a better tone in the stock market. May contracts reached 98 1/2c, up 1 1/2c from the previous close, and July 96 1/2c, up 1 1/2c.

Wheat closed 1 1/2c higher, May 98 1/2c, July 96 1/2c; corn 1 1/2c up, May 56 1/2c, July 56 1/2c; oats 1 1/2c higher.
