

LENT TO BEGIN WEDNESDAY IN CHURCHES HERE

"And He was there in the wilderness forty days—and the angels ministered unto Him." St. Mark 1:13.

Throughout the Christian world the observance of the Lenten period begins with Ash Wednesday, February 7. Ash Wednesday is so called, and designated as the first day of Lent, because of the fact people in early times were blessed with ashes from the palms used Palm Sunday of the preceding year.

Ash Wednesday is preceded on the church calendar by Shrove Tuesday, the name derived from the word, "to shrove," for on that day it was the custom for persons to go to the priest and confess their sins and make spiritual preparation for the Lenten period.

The season of Lent, observed in memory of the suffering and death of Christ and his 40 days of prayer and fasting in the wilderness, continues until Easter morning. Easter this year is early, falling on Sunday, March 24.

All churches in the city are combining this year in a world day of prayer which will be held the first Friday in Lent, February 9, in the First Methodist church parlors at the corner of Tenth and High streets. The morning session is from 10 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon. At noon a paper sack lunch will be served and all women are requested to bring their own service. The hostess church will provide coffee.

The afternoon session will continue from 1:15 p. m. to 4 p. m. This is a union service sponsored by the women of the various city churches. All churches and the public in general are invited to participate in this service. ACKERMAN TELLS OF PENITENTIARY VOCATIONAL PLANS

Sergeant Leigh Ackerman of the Klamath Falls police department, returned here Sunday from Salem after attending a meeting of the Oregon Association of City Police Officers to which he was elected second vice president.

Ackerman said that "hopes of the administration of the state penitentiary to afford some system of vocational education for prisoners may be realized as soon as space is available," according to a report made by Warden George Alexander. The new parole system, with six trained parole officers in the field, was commended by the warden, Ackerman reported.

"The state warden advised law officers to make use of the state identification bureau maintained by the penitentiary," Ackerman said.

Young Actress to Make Bow Here in Passion Play Cast

The youngest actress who has appeared before the footlights of a Klamath Falls stage in many years, will make her bow on Friday afternoon, February 9, when the Lumen Passion Play is presented on the stage of the high school auditorium.

She is little Miss Johanna Meier, 23 months old, and while her appearance is brief, she in no way is an unimportant member of the cast of more than one hundred players who present the celebrated Lumen play.

Little Johanna appears as one of the children whom the Christus blesses when he makes his entrance into the city of Jerusalem. Like her distinguished father, she is making her first appearance in a Passion play. Meier first appeared in the play when he was but ten weeks old. He is of the seventh generation in his family to appear in a Christus role.

The Lumen Passion play is the first English spoken version of the story of Christ to appear in Klamath Falls. About 11 years ago a production was seen and heard here in the German language. Meier brought his play to America, translated it into English, and since then has made more than 5000 appearances.

Arrangements have been made whereby public school students may attend the special student matinees on Friday and Saturday, February 9 and 10.

U. S. REVISES SCHEDULE FOR BEET ACREAGE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—The agriculture department announced today that acreage allotments for California sugar beet growers this year will not be less than the acreage contracted with sugar beet processors on January 27.

The announcement modified an acreage determination made by the department on January 29.

The new determination provided that the acreage must be land on which substantial expenditures had been made by producers for the purpose of growing sugar beets, or on land leased for growing sugar beets.

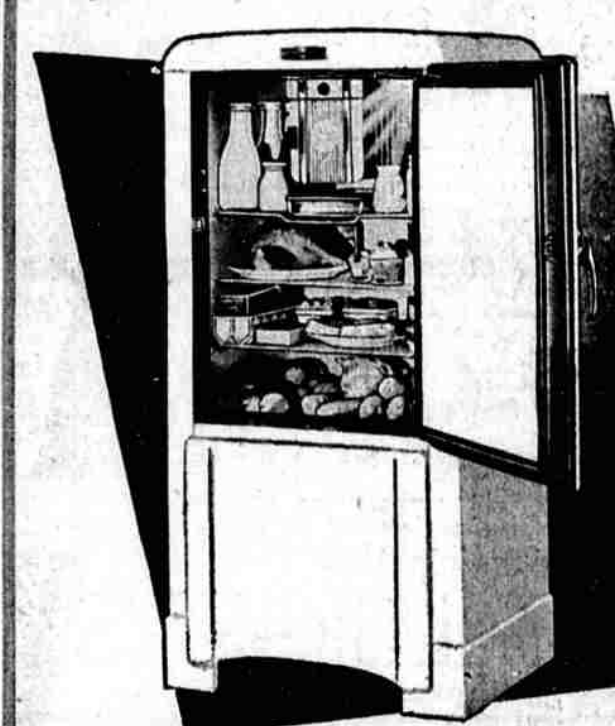
