The Oregon Voter, Portland political weekly, in its current issue gives thumb-nail sketches on three Klamath candidates for office. They follow:

U. S. Halentine, Klamath Falls attorney, announces he will be a candidate for re-election to the state senate. He was republican nominee for representative in congress against Walter M. Pierce two years ago and carried his home county of Klamath by the handsome majority of 6107 to 4274 — but this was the only county he carried, losing the district by 25,557 to 35,260. He is popular in Klamath county. In the senate he kept voting company with Kenin, Mahoney, Rose, Ashby Dickson, Dorothy Lee and Ellis and was the least colorful of the seven who rated highest in CIO favor. Was industrious as chairman of senate judiciary committee and capable in presentations on the floor; affable, courteous, obliging, circumspect; fully worth \$3 a day to those who think that is enough.

Henry E. Perkins has placed himself in the race for circuit judge in Klamath county. He has practiced law at Klamath Falls since 1926. After graduation from University of Missouri he was deputy county collector in 1914 was elected county attorney (Clatsop county). Three years later enlisted in the army and served 14 months, but did not get overseas. From 1921 to 1926 practiced law at Casper, Wyo., active there in CofC and helping organize Community Chest. At Klamath Falls has been associated with Attorney R. C. Groesbeck, but not formally partners. Organizations he has served include Klamath county CofC, Masons, Kiwanis, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Birthplace was Plattsburg, Mo., the natal day Feb. 10, 1887. Early education there, then to university. During college vacations worked on original surveys in Butte Root mountains, Montana, a brother holding this government surveying contract. Claims no particular hobbies other than activities on behalf of youth.

A. C. Yaden, practicing attorney in Klamath Falls since admission to the bar in 1916, is a candidate for circuit judge in Klamath county. He has served as referee in bankruptcy since 1934. For brief period was deputy district attorney; for some years was vice president county bar association and in 1921 presided Klamath County Sportsman's association. Member Oregon State Bar association. From 1917 to 1923 in law partnership with father-in-law, J. C. Ruthenim who retired in 1933. Attended U. of O. two years then studied law at night school in Portland. Worked as carpenter as young man. Born Oct. 26, 1887, in Laurel county, Ky., descendant of Joseph Yaden, (correct), drum major in Revolutionary war. Family moved to Klamath Falls in 1901, where he completed high school in 1911. Married Irene Virginia Ruthenim in 1911 and they have three married children and one grandchild. Hobbies confined to fishing and hunting.

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Philanthropist Leaves Wealth For Charity Use

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (AP.)—Not even death stopped the multi-million-dollar philanthropies of Edward S. Harkness.

The financier, whose vast fortune stemmed from the foundation of Standard Oil and whose life-time benefactors ran more than \$100,000,000, left the bulk of his estate in trust to his widow with instructions that it go to charitable and educational institutions after her death.

The estate was valued at "more than \$10,000" when his will was filed yesterday.

Mrs. Harkness, the former Mary E. Stillman, and Malcolm P. Aldrich, general manager of the Harkness interests, were named executors.

Aldrich was given \$400,000 as "a mark of my friendship and his great service to me."

Altogether Harkness, who died January 29 at the age of 66, bequeathed \$1,250,000 to 78 employees.

He never made a public speech nor gave an interview during his life, and left no children to share in his wealth.

The family fortune started when his father, Stephen, contributed \$70,000 to keep the oil concern of John D. Rockefeller afloat when the oil man found himself in difficulties.

LUMBERJACK PASTOR TALKS HERE TONIGHT

This Wednesday evening at the First Presbyterian church, the Rev. George H. Redden of Bend, Oregon, will be present at the 7:30 o'clock service in the evening, and will speak of his work in the lumber camps of the Northwest.

Mr. Redden is known all over the United States as "The Lumberjack Evangelist." He has made tours of the country, speaking in some of the most exclusive and aristocratic Presbyterian churches of America. He has been offered the pastorate of one of the outstanding eastern congregations of that denomination, but has never deviated from the special work to which he has devoted himself.

Years ago, George Redden was preparing himself for the operatic stage. He had taken years of training under some of the greatest teachers of voice in America. Then, came his conversion. Against the persuasion of many of his friends, he renounced all such worldly advancement and became an evangelist to the lumber camps and all over the northwest, out in the forests and in the mess halls, his marvelous tenor voice has sung "The Man of Galilee" and other sacred songs.

This Wednesday evening Mr. Redden will present pictures portraying his special work. It is probable also that he may be invited to sing. The general public is invited to hear him.

On Thursday afternoon at 2:15 o'clock in the church parlors of the First Presbyterian church, Mr. Redden will address the Women's Missionary society. Mrs. Theodore Smith, president, will be in charge. Mrs. Logan Black will lead in the devotions. Mrs. C. W. Hornbrook is chairman of the social committee. The study deals with the great work of the National Missions board of the Presbyterian church of North America, which carries forward not only enterprises in English, but 62 missions in foreign languages within the United States. One department of the home mission work under this board is that of evangelization among the loggers and in the lumber camps. In this work, along with other national figures, George Redden is engaged. "Pullman sleepers," says the local pastor, "are not the usual or necessary equipment in any congregation as he proclaims a rough-and-ready gospel of salvation to all men to find. That he is thorough-going, however, one only needs to ask the lumberjack evangelist about his son, George, who has been approached by practically all of the western universities and who seems headed towards an all-American football position."

It is probable that Mr. Redden will sing at Kiwanis club dinner on Thursday as he is a distinguished Kiwanian and efforts are being made to have him do so.

WALLACE ASKS FOR OREGON GRASS SEED

Samples of grass seed made famous nationally through production in Oregon are being supplied to Henry A. Wallace, secretary of agriculture, by the farm crops department at OSC. Wallace requested this seed through N. E. Dodd, director of the western division of the AAA.

Grasses for which seed is being sent include reed canary grass, bulbous blue grass, tall fescue and meadow foxtail and created wheat grass. Oregon is the chief source of seed for many of these grasses, most of which have been introduced through the experiment station or were developed in Oregon counties, as was the case with bulbous blue grass.

A group of local men, headed by E. L. Gramblit, have developed plans for the project with the idea of making it a mission and stopping place for transient men. They have asked the city to sponsor it as a WPA project, in order to get WPA labor for construction. Maintenance, according to the plan, is to be largely on a donation basis, both for work and supplies.
