STOCKS REFUSE GENERAL CLIMB IN SLOW TRADE

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (AP) — A few industrials and metals tilted the stock market's lid today but failed to develop sufficient energy for a general advance.

The rate of transactions, approximating 500,000 shares, was even lower than yesterday.

Brokers, while disappointed at the sluggishness of sales, took a modicum of comfort from the fact that quotations did not follow the present downward turn in business indices, and the bullishness inclined called the session a "moral victory."

Among the leading share gainers were Allied Chemical, Westinghouse, Union Carbide, Kennecott, American Smelting, Phelps Dodge, Continental Can, Sloss-Sheffield, Sears Roebuck, Dow Chemical, DuPont and General Motors.

WHEAT FADES IN CLOSING SESSION

CHICAGO, Feb. 7 (AP) — Temporary strength which the wheat market derived today from reports of improved flour demand faded in the final hour and prices slipped fractionally lower.

Profit taking inspired by recent small price gains and prospects of fresh rain or snow over much of the grain belt the next 24 hours weakened the market. Wheat closed 1/4c lower than yesterday, May 98-98 1/2c, July 95 1/2c; corn 1/4c down, May 56 1/2c, July 56c; oats 1 1/2c higher.

WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, Feb. 7 (AP-USDA) — Most topmakers and manufacturers were so indifferent toward domestic wools that holders were making little effort to close sales on the Boston wool market today. Holders who have solicited bids received only a few offers. These bids were considerably lower than asking prices and holders would not accept them. Asking prices were around 40 to 42 cents, in the grease, delivered, for country packed three-eighths and quarter blood bright fleeces, while the scattered bids were around 38 to 39 cents, in the grease. Holders wanted around 50 to 52 cents, scoured basis, for short to average French combing lengths, fine territory wools in original bales, but the few bids were in the range \$2 to \$5 cents, scoured basis, and buyers were not keen for the wool at this level.

INDIAN FILES SUIT FOR ALIENATION OF WIFE'S AFFECTIONS

Dibbon Cook, charging alienation of the affections of his wife, has filed suit against Jonathan Crume, asking \$10,000 compensatory damages and \$500 punitive damages. Both are Indians living at Sprague River.

Cook asserted in the complaint that Crume began associating with his wife, the former Anita Hecoceta, also an Indian, in June, 1939, and that the two were presently in company with each other. Cook married Miss Hecoceta October 14, 1935.

Attorneys of the plaintiff are Merryman and Napier.

The plaintiff has also filed a divorce complaint, charging his wife with cruel and inhuman treatment. He is also represented by Merryman and Napier in the latter suit.

PROPERTY DEAL ON FOR ROTARY PARK

More steps were taken Tuesday to clear the way for the development of Rotary park, in Industrial addition.

INDIANS DOMINATE JUVENILE CASES

Only four white children were involved in 13 cases in which the juvenile court took action here in January, according to Juvenile Officer Phyllis Corbett.

Two white girls were placed on probation, and one was shortly afterwards committed to a Catholic girls school in Portland. Two small children were declared dependent and placed in a boarding home, and one boy was committed to the state training school.

Nine of the cases involved Indian children. A girl was sent to the St. Rose Industrial school at Portland and two girls were placed on parole. A boy was placed on probation and two boys were sent to the state training school.
