Passion Play Opens Friday

Josef Meier Devotes Life To Passion Play Portrayals

Dramatic ability alone does not qualify characters for their parts in the Luenen Passion Play of the Black Hills, to appear here for three matinee and three night performances starting Friday, February 9, for Josef Meier, the feature actor portraying the part of the Christ, in the road to Golgotha scene, must carry the cross weighing 160 pounds for nearly five minutes, though he is but a slight man.

In this respect he is no different from Christ, for the Saviour was also of delicate build, still He had to shoulder the burden of the cross upon which he later was crucified. Mr. Meier doesn't evade this burden when he lives the part of the Master. The cross of necessity must be heavy because it must be substantial enough to support his weight when he is "nailed" on the cross arm. This is only one manner in which he fulfills all duties of his part, which has been his life.

Seventh in his family to portray the part of the Christ in the original Luenen version of the Passion Play, his whole life has been centered in the drama and the part. His first appearance in the production was at the age of ten weeks in the role of the infant Jesus, and since that time throughout 34 years of his life, just as those that preceded him, he has been trained step by step for the role. He now takes that of the Christ, the greatest figure in history.

Mr. Meier will be heard in addresses at different local and civic and fraternal organizations when he arrives with his troupe of 100 actors. They are showing in Portland at present and will come here directly from there. Special arrangements have been made with the school board for student matinees on Friday and Saturday, February 9 and 10. Student tickets are available at all public schools.
