EVERETT MAY SIGN

Snowy Gustafson may take his 1940 Pelican football team to Everett, Wash., for the second game of next fall's schedule, if negotiations now under way between Everett high school and KUHS pan out.

A letter Snowy received this week from Roy Sandberg, Everett coach, has been turned over to Principal Emery for a final okay before the contest is definitely arranged. It is expected that Emery will sanction the game, which would be the first leg of a lasting home-and-home arrangement.

If signed, the game will give the Pelicans their longest football trip. Except for games with Dunsuir, Eureka, Weed and Chico, the locals have never come up against out-of-state competition.

"I'd like to give the boys the trip," said Snowy, who added that Everett will probably turn out to be one of the toughest teams on the 1940 roster.

Last season the Washingtonians were undefeated and generally recognized as one of the outstanding eleven in their state. Everett has long been the home of strong high school football, ranging back to the days when George Wilson's eleven gained national recognition.

Sandberg, former coach at College of Puget Sound, more recently coached at Franklin high in Portland, tutoring the beginnings of the strong 1939 Franklin squad.

The game has been lined up for September 20 and if approved will be the seventh contest which has been definitely arranged for the coming season.

HOOP FIGURES GIVE BEAVERS EASIEST PATH IN DIVISION

The basketball mathematicians got their pencils out today in an effort to do up his northern division, Pacific Coast conference basketball race. Here's what they produced:

If Oregon State, now way out in front, finishes its remaining six games at a 500 clip, winning three and losing three, Washington State, the second place team, must win seven of its remaining nine games to tie. Oregon must win seven of its remaining eight games to tie.

Should Oregon State win four of its remaining six games, Washington State must win eight of its nine remaining games and Oregon must win all of the games remaining on its schedule to tie the Beavers.

But the Beavers have the easiest schedule of the three contending teams for the remainder of the season. Slats Gill's team has two games at home with Washington State, two with Oregon, one at home and one at Eugene and two with Washington in Seattle.

Washington State has a tough schedule. After games with the Beavers in Corvallis Friday and Saturday nights they go to Eugene to tackle Oregon Monday and Tuesday, then home to meet Oregon in two more games. Following this tour they meet Washington in a two-game series and end up with a one night stand against Idaho.

Oregon, after its two games with Washington State next week, goes against Oregon State twice and winds up its season with an inland Empire trip and two games each against Idaho and Washington State.

Washington and Idaho, the "forgotten men" of the conference, open a two-game series in Seattle Friday night.
