KLAMATH THIRD IN TRAFFIC RECORD FOR 1939 CONTEST

SALEM, Feb. 10 (AP)—Medford, Bend, Burns and Woodburn were division winners in the 1939 Oregon cities traffic safety contest. Secretary of State Earl Snell, sponsor of the contest, announced today.

Medford, only city in the top division to report reduction in traffic accidents over 1938, was first in the 10,000 or over population class. Portland was second and Klamath Falls and Salem tied for third.

JOHN MERRILEES DIES ON STREET

John Merrilees, 51, collapsed in front of the Klamath county courthouse shortly after 9 o'clock Saturday morning and died en route to the Klamath Valley hospital. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Mr. Merrilees has been employed during the past 10 years as maintenance man at the Willard hotel. He complained of pain to hotel employees and said he was going to the drug store for medicine. He died a short time later.

A native of Dumbarton, Scotland, where he was born December 14, 1889, Mr. Merrilees had lived in this country many years. He is survived by two sons, James, who formerly lived in this city where he was employed by the First National bank and also the Willard hotel, and Robert. Both are now in Indianapolis, Ind.

Sheriff Lloyd L. Low stepped from his car in front of the courthouse just as Mr. Merrilees collapsed. He rushed him to the hospital. It was learned. Remains are at the Earl Whitlock funeral home. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

DAMAGE SUIT FILED BY FORMER EMPLOYEE

Suit has been filed in the county clerk's office for \$50,000 damages against Southern Pacific company, a corporation, by Winston E. Donart, formerly employed by the company as a call boy.

Donart alleges in the complaint that he sustained an injury on March 24, 1937, while on the job and that as a result he has been unable to work since May 13, 1938. The complaint states that Donart, while climbing over a flat car, to deliver a message, slipped and fell, due to allegedly faulty equipment on the car. In the fall he is said to have received injuries to his left knee which have resulted in complications.

Attorneys for the plaintiff are Hildebrand and Billings of Oakland, Calif., and U. S. Balentine of this city.
