

"Pioneer Women" Topic At DAR Meet

Mrs. E. H. Balsiger Entertains Members of Eulalona Chapter at Home on Monday Evening

At the regular February meeting of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, held Monday evening, February the fifth, at the home of Mrs. E. H. Balsiger, Mrs. William Owsley presented an interesting story of "Pioneer Women of the Northwest." Mrs. Owsley told a brief life story of each of the following women:

Jane Barnes, first white woman in the Pacific northwest; Margaret McLoughlin, wife of Dr. John McLoughlin; Narcissa Whitman, first woman teacher; Eliza Spaulding, second teacher; Anna Pittman Lee, wife of Jason Lee; Sacajawea, Indian guide of Lewis and Clark expedition; the Dorian woman, wife of guide with Wilson Hunt Price party (Astor men); Jane, Nez Perce Indian guide; Mercer Girty, marriageable girl; Asa Mercer, brought to Seattle; Eliza Ann Brooks, woman who crossed the plains with her six children; Tabitha Brown, co-founder of Pacific University, and last but not least, Abigail Scott Duniway, "mother of equal suffrage in Oregon" who worked for more than forty years to win equal rights, politically, financially, and socially, for women. Like other pioneer leaders in reform movements, Mrs. Duniway was for many years the object of ridicule and even abuse and slander. But with the success that came in the later years of her life she became known as "Oregon's grand old woman." Today her name is inscribed in the hall of fame in Washington, D. C.

During the business session of the chapter, Mrs. H. A. Nitschelm, regent, presided. Miss Virginia West, chairman of the DAR good citizenship Pilgrimage committee, reported that eight high schools in the county will participate in the selection of a contestant from Klamath county for the state list, from which one applicant will be chosen for the trip to Washington, D. February the twenty-second, being the anniversary of the birth of George Washington, "father of our country," the chapter presented the following inscription on the tomb of Washington for reading:

AT MOUNT VERNON

Washington, the brave, the wise, Supreme in war, in council, and the good, in peace, Valiant without ambition, discreet without fear, Confident without presumption, In disaster, calm; in success, moderate; in all, himself. The hero, the patriot, the Christian. The father of nations, the friend of mankind, Who, when he had won all, renounced all, And sought in the bosom of his family and of nature, retirement, And in the hope of religion, immortality.

Ionian Singers To Appear Next Week

Second of Series in Concert Association Programs Scheduled in Klamath Falls February 12

The large and unique repertoire of the Ionian Singers, male voice ensemble which will be presented here on Monday evening, February the twelfth, in the Klamath Union high school, by the Klamath Cooperative Concert association, is the accumulation of a number of years of unremitting quest, of culling and sifting, of sampling and discarding. Until the recent reformation in the quality of glee club programs, the best male voice music, according to the Ionians, lay not on display counters but in music-house basements among the "discards."

Happily, they say, this situation is different today; some forgotten classics are being reprinted, and serious contemporary composers are finding the male ensemble worthy of their attention.

For some of the early Latin masterpieces the Ionians are indebted to persons close to the Vatican. Other little-known but beautiful compositions have been picked up here and there abroad. Friends among conductors and musicians have offered valuable suggestions. Musicians, composers, have written expressly for the Ionians. Folk-tune settings have been adapted to their use, or arranged afresh by the Ionians or by interested composers.

Thus, during the course of time, they have gathered a rare treasure of classics, madrigals, glees, modern art-songs and folk-tunes. It has been their policy to eschew "arrangements" of the classics, believing that such adaptations often do violence to the composer's original conception. But much madrigal and church music, they believe, is amenable to simple transposition from the mixed-voice compass to that of the male-voice.
