SNOWY SIGNS EUGENEANS
Fritz Kramer's unusually powerful Eugene high Axemen have been signed by Coach Snowy Gustafson for game September 27, closing another gap in the tough 1940 Pelican grid schedule.

The game, Snowy says, will probably be played at Modoc field, although the two schools have not definitely agreed on the matter. The Axemen played here four years ago, but it will be Gustafson's first meeting with the northerners, who never fail to knock over their share of Oregon prep football machines.

The game leaves only one hole in the Pelican schedule, October 4, although the Klamath coach may tack one more on the end of the season, either November 15 or November 22. He favors a game with a Portland team, but would accept any other good upstate club.

Closing of the September 27 spot assures the Pelicans of one of the toughest early season rosters in years, with Chico high — who passed the Pelican's silly in last fall's opener — scheduled to start hostilities again, then Everett high, of Washington, and Eugene in the third weekend.

Principal Emery stamped his okay on the Everett game. Only final word from the northern school is awaited to clinch it.

MARINER SET FOR TOP GO: BEARDED NAZI MEETS PRINCE

Cocky as Arturo Godoy in the famous 14th, after his win over World Champ Danny McShain last week, Sergeant Bob Kenaston, Gold Hill mariner, is all set to whale King Kong Clay-ton, negro paralyzer, at the armory tonight in the headline bout.

After the surprise finish Tuesday night when Kenaston snapped out of a McShain pile-driver and won the match, the sour-puss Gold Hill boy is ready to cut a new swath in wrestling circles.

He claims King Kong will be first of a long list of victims tonight when the two huge grapplers square off in the main tussle. The bout has long been sought by Klamath fans, among whom the dusky southern wrestler is one of the most popular of Klamath performers.

In Kenaston, the negro will be meeting an opponent nearly as noted as himself for brute strength. The ex-mariner has made the Gold Hill swirl hold and Gold Hill crab famous as two of the most dangerous maneuvers in the game. Clayton, always the gentleman, will probably find a good many unorthodox tactics slung at him by the unscrupulous ex-sailor.

The Professor Quiz of the grappling game—Dutch Schultz—has been signed for an appearance in the middle tussle against Prince Nihalakis, stream-lined Arabian who has carved a long list of wins in Klamath.

Schultz, no relative of the belligerent Nazi, Hans Hitler, is a rough but fairly clean grappler, who uses brains along with his manpower. He has the reputation for excellent leg-work and an amazing assortment of mat tricks.

In the preliminary bout Ernie Piluso, Italian mat wizard from the Multnomah Athletic club at Portland, will meet another former Winged M wrestler, Ben Sherman.

Piluso is an exponent of lightning speed, while Sherman set a new record for wriggling out of back-breakers in his initial appearance here last week.

Bob Cummings, experienced referee and grappler, will be third man in the ring to replace the vacationing Earl Yoakley.

Hank Evans, Chiloquin lad and University of Oregon's top skier, was named the best all-around man at the University of Nevada winter carnival and ski tournament recently.

Chinese Hoopers Will Meet David Quintet Saturday

Klamath cage addicts will be treated to a double feature of tonight basketball Saturday night when the Bearded Aces of the House of David tangle with the barnstorming Hong Wah Kues, Chinese quintet from San Francisco, in addition to the Pelican-Lakeview battle on the high school court.

The Bearded Aces, said to be the only bonafide team from the whiskey reigned order in Benton Harbor, Mich., are composed of ex-college stars from the Midwest. They were credited with only 22 losses in 124 contests for the 1938-39 season. In the preceding season the Aces dropped only 14 out of a schedule of 55 games.

The bearded men are led by Bob Hallisey, six-foot-two-inch forward. Hallisey started at Holy Cross before joining the David crew three years ago. Harley Wall at the other forward post, is an ex-University of Wisconsin player and noted for his deadly accuracy from mid-court.

Baird Curry, another six-foot-two-inch, handles the pivot spot and is a former Wisconsin State Teachers ace. Count Clay, University of Kansas alumnus and Ken Livingston, out of Tennessee, both adept ball handlers, hold down the guard positions.

The Chinese team is captained by Ming Gunn Gok, center, team-mate at Galileo high school, San Francisco, with Hank Lutseff. He made the All-City high school basketball team and has had collegiate experience with the University of California.

Another member of the San Francisco All-City lineup is Wong Buck Hong, three-year letterman at Sacramento Junior college.

Other squad members are Hing Tai Sun, forward; Leo Ho Chiu, guard; Lee Wah Quong, guard, and Yip Chung Fong, utility.

SCORE SPREE PUTS OREGON IN TIE FOR SECOND SPOT

EUGENE, Feb. 13 (UP)—The University of Oregon basketball team last night humiliated Washington State college, 71-41, in one of the highest scoring northern games on record. The win gave the Webfoots a second place tie with the Cougars.

Oregon led 34 to 24 at halftime.

The Webfoots rolled as they hadn't since last year, when Oregon won the national collegiate championship. Washington State offered some competition in the first half, but tired in the second as the Ducks plied in bucket after bucket.

Oregon got away to an almost immediate lead, and at the four minute mark the score was 13-3. With big Hank Anderson pacing the offensive, the score went to 18-7. Baskets by Chase and Lindeman narrowed the spread to 30-24—the closest the Cougars ever came—near the end of the half.

In the second period the Oregonians went wild, running up 20 points in eight minutes and converting 10 of 20 shots for an amazing 50% average.

Coach Howard Hobson sent in his reserves with the score 55-35, and play opened up in the last 7 minutes. Substitute forward Red McNeely tipped in a field goal two seconds before the gun to push the Webfoot score past the 50 mark.
