CHANCELLOR OF STATE SPEAKER AT CLUB MEET

LAKEVIEW—Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter and Alumnus Secretary Walter Held of Oregon State college and Elmer Fancett, alumnus secretary of the University of Oregon, were guests at the joint meeting here Tuesday noon of the Lake county chamber of commerce and the Lakeview Rotary club. Chancellor Hunter praised the application of scientific methods of the fundamental problems of the day such as is exemplified by the scientific practices employed by the youth of Oregon in their 4-H club work and Future Farmers of America projects. He drew a contrast between that picture and the application by the European dictators of the latest achievements of the scientists to the destruction of life, liberty and happiness.

In the evening the parties were the guests of the two institutions and of the parents of the students now attending the two schools at a banquet which was held at the Hunter's Hot Springs hotel. Chancellor Hunter told the audience of the objectives of the board of higher education and urged the audience to take every opportunity to keep informed on the important problems of the commonwealth and of its educational enterprises.

TULELAKE PLANS DRAINAGE DITCH

TULELAKE—City councilmen were assured this week by B. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath project of the reclamation bureau, that a drainage ditch will be dug as soon as weather permits which will in the future eliminate damage to lots on the west side of town caused by waste water and seepage. The report was made at this week's council session by J. W. Carlisle. City dad's in deference to observance of Lincoln's birthday, postponed the meeting from Monday night until Tuesday night.

raise funds to carry on cooperatively with the biological survey an organized patrol of areas where the most damage is done each spring.

Following the suggestion of T. B. Murray, Portland, regional director of the biological survey who met recently with association members to formulate some plan to eliminate damage, funds raised from the dance will be used to purchase explosives with which to

frighten the feeding ducks and geese. Armed with a permit for the use of bombs and other ammunition, a patrol, it is planned, will make a daily circuit of the area where damage is heaviest. While the program is yet in the formative stage, it is expected to be on a working basis before hay and grain growth starts next spring. Ranchers also may obtain permits, distribution of which will be supervised by the survey and the sportsmen's association.

The herding plan has worked effectively in rice fields of California and it is believed it will largely eliminate the trouble experienced here in past years. The fund raising dance will be held in the Legion hall with Beldy Evans dance band furnishing the music. Plans have been under the direction of William Seliger, Frank Graham, A. M.
