Crater Ski School Opens; Lift Nears Completion

Ski classes under the sponsorship of the Crater Lake Ski club got under way last Sunday with approximately 20 tyros weaving through the fundamentals of the sport under the guidance of instructor Gene Shellworth.

Owing to transportation difficulties, the class was a half-hour late in starting, but it was promised Friday that next Sunday's class would begin at 10:45 sharp at the same location. It was also announced by the committee that in the event the road to the rim should be closed, school will be held on the small knob near the base of Solinsky hill.

Embert Fossum, president of the club, revealed Thursday that, with the exception of 30 feet of cable, all the essential parts of the ski lift are ready for installation. The cable, shipped from New York on January 22, is still in transit.
