## Humble Egg Is the Cook's Best Friend

Eggs divided against themselves need not fall. The yolks can be used for mayonnaise, pudding sauce, plain blanc mange, French toast, muffins and cakes. The whites are used in frosting, meringues, maccaroons, white cakes, angel cake and gelatin whips.

**Marshmallow Frosting**  
Two cups sugar, 1-2 cup boiling water, 2 tablespoons white corn syrup or 1-4 teaspoon cream of tartar, 3 (or 2) egg whites, 1-4 teaspoon salt, flavoring.

Add water and syrup to sugar; stir until dissolved. Let come to a boil covered. Uncover and cook until syrup spins a long thread, or to 242 deg. F. Add salt to egg whites and beat until stiff.

When syrup stops bubbling add gradually to egg whites. Beat well after each addition. When too stiff for rotary beater, use whisk or spoon and beat until frosting will hold its shape. If 2

egg whites are used, cook a little less, or to 240 deg. F. Use any desired flavoring.

**Hollandaise Sauce**  
One-half cup butter, 2 to 4 egg yolks, 1 tablespoon lemon juice,

thoroughly blended. Add salt, a dash of cayenne, and boiling water. Return to double boiler and stir until the sauce is thick. Be careful not to overcook it or it will curdle.

## PINE LUMBER SALES FALL OFF SLIGHTLY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 16 (AP)—Reports from 110 Western Pine association mills showed last week's new business was \$5,531,000 board feet of lumber com-

pared with \$5,092,000 the previous week.

Shipments totaled \$7,957,000 feet compared with \$6,557,000 and production \$3,851,000 feet compared with \$2,051,000. For the corresponding week a year ago orders were \$5,730,000 board feet, shipments \$5,217,000 and production \$2,595,000.

To date orders are \$56,906,000 feet against \$12,333,000 a year ago.

## Decide What Colors are Best For You--Then Stick to Them

The new yellows, ranging from butter and banana to mustard and gold, require rouge and lipstick with yellow rather than blue undertones. Yellowish red makeup will take an important place beside clear, bright reds, and the rust shades are sure to become popular.

The rusts will be red with brown undertones. This doesn't mean that orange shades will be revived. Seldom are they subtle enough to be flattering to the average complexion.

Most shades of yellow are naturally becoming to the dark-haired woman with dark eyes and white skin. If she is slightly yellow, however, her makeup must compensate for the fact that yellows usually further accentuate yellow tones.

Greenish yellows, like chartreuse, are best for the woman whose coloring is distinctly—either absolutely blond or absolutely brunette. It takes a lot of skillful making up to enable the brown-haired woman whose coloring is

neither quite blond or quite brunette to wear chartreuse.

**Watch Out For Your Colors**  
Clear, bright yellows, as well as scarlet, royal blue, sharp green and black with stark white accents, are colors which the woman with vivid coloring might well consider. The dramatic coloring of one whose eyes are almost black, skin pearly white and hair dark, often makes muted, misty tones in clothes seem wishy-washy.
