HOSPITALIZATION CONTRACT SIGNED BY SCHOOL FACULTY

LAKEVIEW—Nineteen teachers of the Lake County Teachers' association have formed a health group and signed a hospitalization contract with the Lakeview hospital, Inc., which went into effect the first of February. This is the second agreement of its kind to be adopted in Lakeview; employees of the Underwood Lumber company have been under such a plan for some time.

Dana Verry, Lakeview teacher, was chosen to collect the monthly fees. Under the terms of the contract and, according to certain conditions and provisions made in it, teachers who sign the contract are to receive such medical and hospital attention as they need while in Lake county.

SOLON SPEAKS TO LAKEVIEW GROUP

LAKEVIEW—"Know Your State" was the theme of the regular monthly meeting of the Lakeview branch of the American Association of University Women at a luncheon at the hotel February 17. B. K. Snyder, representative to the Oregon legislature from the 29th district, was the speaker. His topic was "Equalization of the School Tax in Oregon."

Table decorations for the meeting were a wide variety of foods canned or packaged in Oregon. The answering of a series of questions concerning Oregon and the singing of the state song helped carry out the theme for the meeting, which was planned by Miss Miriam Gilbert, program chairman, and Mrs. John Burcham, president.

MUSIC COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY PTA

A short business meeting was held by the Chiloquin PTA at the school gym, Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. Routine matters of business were taken up and discussed until the close of the meeting when Earl Bradford took the floor and made a motion that the PTA appoint a committee to meet with the county school board and demand that the curricula for the grade school be revised to the extent that instrumental music would be taught in the school.

Bradfield stated that he had conferred with Superintendent Evans, and then with County Superintendent Fred Peterson. According to Bradford, Peterson refused to consider the matter, stating that the state department of education set the curricula for the grade schools and that the school board was powerless.

Bradfield went on to state that he had conferred with officials of the state department of education personally and by letter and that they had definitely informed him that the study of such instrumental music, orchestras and bands in grade schools was discretionary with each local school board, and in this case with the Klamath county school board.

The motion was seconded and quickly carried, and a committee was appointed, consisting of Mr. Bradford, Mrs. June Gregory and Mrs. Christy.

Loy Barker, principal of the grade school, addressed the meeting upon this subject and stated he was heartily in favor of the matter, and suggested that if this committee would meet with him at some future date before meeting with the school board, they might receive some information or other assistance which could prove of value in arranging for this course of study.

Bradfield again took the floor and called attention to the present dangerous condition of the gymnasium floor created by the leaky roof upon the gymnasium. "It is our children who are

playing here daily," he stated, "and it is our children who will have wrenched backs, broken arms and broken legs if this matter is not promptly remedied." Barker then stated that he had personally inspected the roof and that he was making a report to the county school superintendent and the roof would

undoubtedly be repaired before long. One hundred and thirty-five attended.

A dead guinea fowl fell to the playing floor.

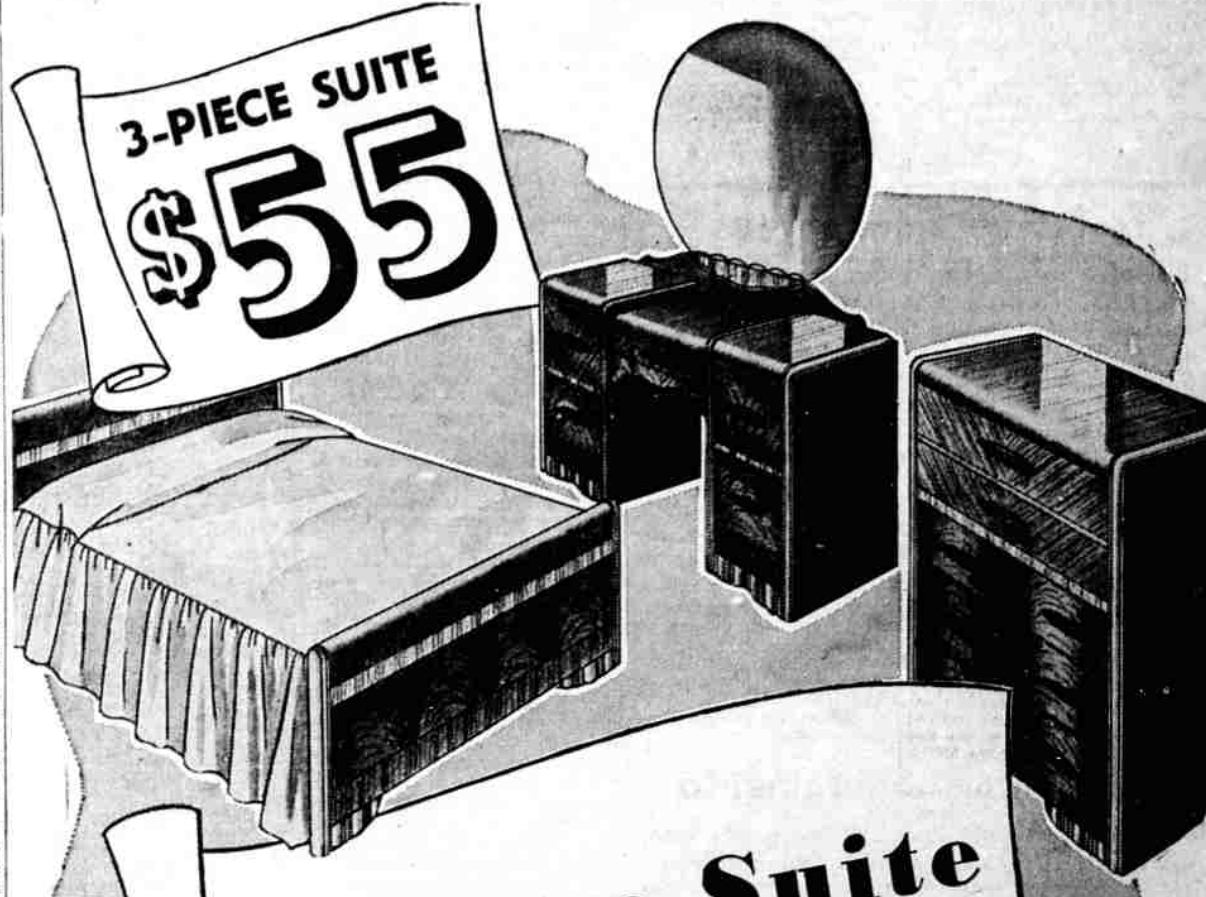
The bird had been placed in the rafters by pranksters, who
