Boston wool houses were making little effort to move greasy combing domestic wools, because in the past few weeks they have found that users who were not in the market for wools were not attracted by price reductions. On the other hand, when wools were urgently needed the prices paid were at, or close to, quotations.

Undergrads Should Be Able To Major in Job-Hunting

High schools and colleges are not doing much about teaching their seniors scientific job-hunting. (And there is a lot of science to it.)

But there is one way the students could get this important course into the school curriculum. They could go to the head of the school and talk frankly with him. They could admit the fears and doubts they haven't admitted to their parents—the fear that they will never be able to sell their services to an employer.

Faculties listen respectfully when students ask for more knowledge, probably because it is such a rare happening.

So in every high school it would pay the boys and girls who mean to look for work in June to ask their school head for a hearing, and admit their need of job-hunting advice.

Once the young people have broken down and confessed that they not only don't know how to write letters of application, but don't even know what to say to a prospective employer in a face-to-face interview, they shouldn't have any trouble getting the course they want.

Then the problem becomes the educator's. He shouldn't fail these ambitious young people by asking Miss Gettlinger to take charge of the course because she happens to have fewer classes than any of the other faculty members.

Business Men Should Teach

In fact he shouldn't even ask a faculty member to teach the course. A young man or woman on the faculty could conduct it, but the students ought to be allowed to hear the dos and don'ts of some of the city's important executives—the men and women who actually hire or turn

down job hunters.

If begun now, such courses could give a lot of much-needed advice by June.

And there would consequently be much less wear and tear on the shoe leather and the self-confidence of this June's graduates than on last year's and those of all the years before.

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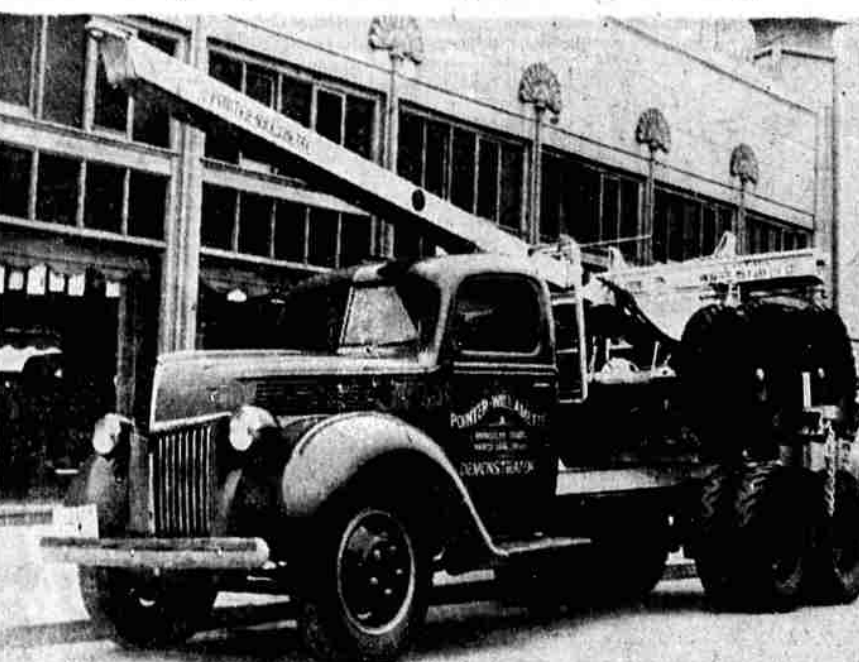


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
