

ART CENTER IN LAST HALF OF FUND CAMPAIGN

With half of the \$1500 fund raised to start a federal art center, the art center association will meet on Monday evening in the circuit court room. It was announced Friday. At that time plans for completing the fund will be discussed.

Members, persons interested in becoming members, and the general public are invited to the meeting.

An effort is being made to collect the remainder of the fund by March 1, the date of Governor Charles Sprague's visit to Klamath Falls.

On this date Governor Sprague, who is an honorary director of the Klamath Falls Art Center, will speak at a mass meeting of the Art Center association at Fremont school auditorium at 4 p. m. The 20-30 club, which is sponsoring the governor's visit in Klamath Falls, has arranged to include this as part of the schedule for the governor's day here. The Klamath Union high school band, under the direction of Charles R. Stanfield, will play in honor of the governor.

When the drive for the funds for the Art Center was first started, the association board planned to raise the amount necessary by individual memberships of one dollar; but with the time allowed already nearing an end, many business firms and individuals are generously assisting with larger amounts. SANITATION UP AT MEETING OF SUBURB GROUP

The problem of sanitation in the suburban areas near Klamath Falls came up for discussion Friday night at a large gathering of interested persons and members of the Suburban League in the Shasta school. Dr. A. E. Bostrom of Portland, assistant state health officer; Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, Klamath county health officer; Willard Cloyes, county sanitation engineer, and members of the county court, were also present.

That the sewage problem in the suburban area is indeed a major problem was voiced by the officials present and a definite plan was offered and approved to obtain adequate sanitation facilities for the surrounding districts.

Dr. Bostrom, Dr. Rozendal, Cloyes, County Judge U. E. Reeder, County Commissioners E. E. Benner and W. F. B. Chase spoke to the league members during the evening.

It was advised that a sanitary district be established and money raised from the residents of the district for a preliminary survey. After the survey is made, an RFC loan could be obtained, it was pointed out, for the installation of sewers and a disposal plant, work to be provided by WPA labor and money obtained through the federal government for a loan period of 20 years at 2 per cent interest.

Through members of the county court and Dr. Rozendal a request was made that a deficit of \$500 be raised by the Suburban League in order to retain Cloyes as county sanitary engineer. It is understood that a \$712.50 deficit must be met, of this amount \$500 to be raised by the suburban residents, and the balance contributed by the court. This problem will be taken under advisement, league members said.

The matter of a community hall was also brought up for discussion. Judge Reeder an-

nounced he would donate a purebred calf to be auctioned off, the money to start the building fund. The league already has made contributions toward a favorable site, it is understood. Beginning Saturday, March 2, the league will sponsor a series of card parties to run six consecutive weeks on Saturday nights, money to go into the building fund.

It was announced that the public utilities commission had called a hearing on the present bus problem for Friday, March 15, at 9 a. m. in the city hall. Both Fred Duke and a representative of the Klamath Bus company were ordered to appear at the hearing.

County Clerk Mae K. Short announced her candidacy for reelection. The evening was brought to a close with a supper. The next meeting will be held Friday, March 8.
