

TIONESTA TO BOOST LUMBER CUT IN 1940

TULELAKE—The Shaw lumber mill at Tionesta will cut approximately 5,000,000 more board feet of lumber in 1940 than last season, it was announced this week by Lawrence Shaw, manager of the mill at Tionesta. The total output will reach 40,000,000 feet.

Operations at the mill which employs men practically the year round began on January 1. The mill cuts principally ponderosa pine, about half of the cut being made into boxes at the factory located at the mill. Box material is shipped principally to Sacramento, to Arizona, Texas and Mexico with the lumber shipments billed east to Chicago and New York.

Daily capacity of the mill, Shaw stated, is 225,000 feet. Maximum employment is 400 men. A few women, wives of mill workers assist in the box factory.

The camp, where about 600 persons reside has its own store and postoffice and 60 children attend the Tionesta school.
