

POLITICS RULED OUT IN CENSUS TAKING DUTIES

Census job-holders must refrain from political activity this year.

J. C. Capps, assistant to the director of the bureau of the census, has warned that the Hatch act applies to census jobs. Person's holding such jobs could not serve as members of county republican or democratic central committees.

Capp's statement: "If you hold any office in any political party or membership on any political committee having to do with political campaigns or political management or hold any elective office or other public office touched by political campaigns or political management, you must resign from all such offices before you are employed by the bureau of census. Also, you must devote your full time and attention to the census throughout the period of employment by the bureau."

Section 9 of the Hatch act provides:

"No officer or employee in the executive branch of the federal government, or any agency or department thereof, shall take any active part in political management or in political campaigns. All such persons shall retain the right to vote as they may choose and to express their opinions on all political subjects."

There have been no new announcements of candidacies in the past few days, but others may develop shortly. Harry Bolvin, state representative, is being quoted by his friends as planning to run for re-election on the democratic ticket. He also is expected to run for delegate to the democratic national convention.

COPCO CREW TAKES RED CROSS CLASS; AWARDS PRESENTED

2000 DOGS STILL LACK LICENSES AS DEADLINE NEARS

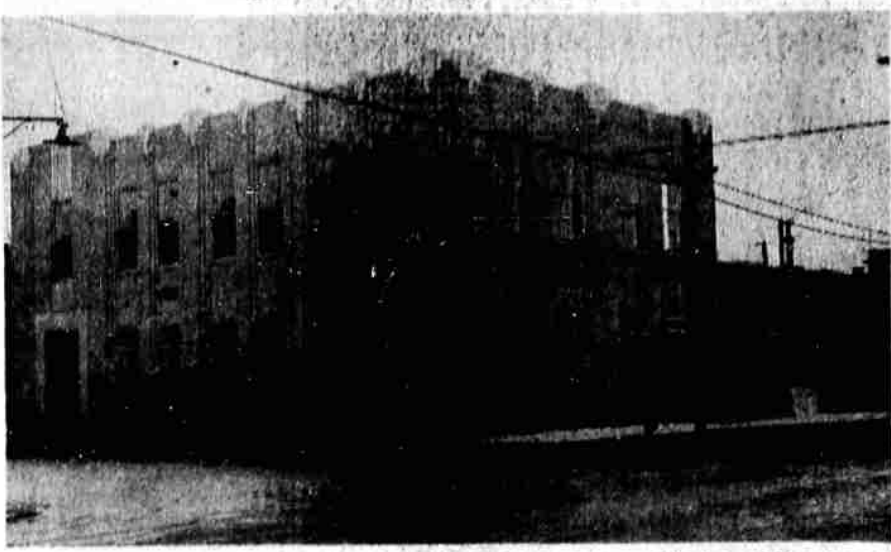

Pelican at College

Having put in a five-month hitch in a fraternity, I think it might be proper to discuss some of the values of belonging to a college fraternity.

College fraternities have caused much bickering since their founding about 100 years ago. At one time there were state laws against them. Today they are a recognized part of college life.

The value in a fraternity is an individual proposition. I am setting down my own impressions. They hold only weight with me.

To me the companionship of fraternity life is the greatest value. Your association with fellows from every conceivable background, if you let it, will be the greatest broadening influence of college life.

Friendships, lasting a life time, are often started through common associations in fraternities. You can not fully appreciate fraternity life until you know the fellows intimately. I am just beginning to appreciate my house because I am just now beginning to know some of the fellows.

The hell week hike of several weeks back was a factor in getting to know boys. My party included an art student, a pre-med student, a business administration student, and a journalism student. The hike was just

about a movable bull session. Each of us told of our past experience and our future hopes. That hike gave life to embryo friendships that may last a life time.

The benefits from fraternity life, as far as I am concerned, are worth much more than the extra sacrifice I make financially.

Please don't think I am tooting the fraternity system's horn. There are faults with it, just as there are faults with all human creations.

Joining a fraternity is an individual proposition. Some are not cut out to be fraternity men. To be a good fraternity man, you must expect to sacrifice some small personal privileges. This sacrifice isn't a thing that harms you. It will do you good. Some of the rough edges of your personality are smoothed so that you fit into a social group.

There is a wealth of good experience in management connected with a fraternity. A house does nearly \$1000 worth of business a month.

As a member of the house, you have a direct responsibility in determining the policy of the business. A fraternity is a business in that it furnishes board and room to its members.

The fraternity is run with very little outside influence. With all the members serving as officers or on committees, fraternity men learn to shoulder responsibility. They also learn to deal with other men.

Fraternities are not an essential part of college life, but as a place for working out

practical problems they are a worthwhile ally of college education.

With final exams less than two weeks away Oregon students are digging in for the assault. Already the social life is easing to a stop. This week end is the last open one. The next two are closed, that is, no social functions are scheduled.

Most embarrassing experience of late: arriving in Portland to attend a big fraternity banquet to find that the pants to my suit had been left in Eugene.

There is a quaint custom around the house that on a birthday a man must go around the lunch table. Every one older swats him a good one. Being the youngest in the house made it disastrous for me when my birthday rolled around last week.

Touchees of spring last week started students planning for spring term. Spring term is THE term. Canoeing and picnics successfully keep the students from their text books. It's an old rule that if you haven't made your grades to be initiated into your fraternity or sorority you can do it spring term, with just a bit of studying. Nobody else does any to speak of.

A pause here to explain about these house grades. Before becoming a member of a fraternity or sorority you must make a C average or 2 points. This is a university regulation. The houses may, on their own, require their pledges to make even a higher showing. Those who make their house grades fall term are initiated in January or February.

Mild attacks of home sickness show that the term is nearing its end. Some of the boys have already begun to count the days until they'll head for home.

A sure indication of the end of the month: the boys have to take in the 15 cent movies, the writer included.
