ROADS STUDIED ON RESERVATION

Klamath county court members and Engineer Frank Howard journeyed to Klamath Agency Tuesday to discuss reservation road problems with the Klamath Indian business committee. The trip followed adoption of an Indian resolution asserting the county is obligated to spend \$25,000 a year on reservation roads. It was agreed at the conference that the Indians will prepare a memorandum setting forth their claims and the reservation road situation in general, and will send it to the court for a formal reply. The Indians called attention to an agreement with an old court, about 10 years ago, on the Chiloquin-Sprague river road, and said the county has not fulfilled its obligation in maintenance of that road.

Klamath Student at OSC Has Hobby of Fly-Tying

The hobby of tying flies has turned out to be a profitable business for Fred Glover, junior in fish and game management, Oregon State college. Fred, whose home town is Klamath Falls and who has been an ardent fisherman and sports lover since childhood days, started tying flies as a hobby six years ago. It took three years of tying flies and experimenting with them as a hobby before he sold his first fly. Since then he has sold thousands of them and now has over \$400 invested in material and equipment. Last year he had orders from 14 different states and two years ago he had an order from Alaska. Most of his orders come from the territory between central Oregon and central California. The orders come during the winter months and he starts working on them immediately. Most of the orders are filled while he is at school. "It takes me about an hour to get my material ready, tie a dozen flies and pack them for shipment," Fred stated. In order to turn out such superior products as he does, Fred imports many of his materials from different countries. The hackles come from China and Japan and the ostrich feathers from Africa. The most expensive feathers are the Jungle Cock feathers from India. Also, he gets many of his feathers from the common birds of this locality such as the grouse, mallard duck and the peacock. The hair used is usually from polar bears, reindeer, moose and deer. His hooks are all imported from Norway and are of the finest tempered steel. Besides these he has to get tinsels, silk and yarn of many colors and shades.
