

CHAMBER ASKS TRAFFIC WORK EAST OF CITY

The chamber of commerce is not advocating any specific plan for improvement of the route between Sixth and Main streets and Lakeview junction. It is in general urging that the highway commission take steps to alleviate the serious traffic conditions existing between those points.

That was the policy outlined at Wednesday's chamber directors meeting by H. P. Bosworth, director in charge of roads and highways. He made the statement in connection with reports that there had been some misunderstanding as to the chamber's policy and attempts, by some misinformed persons, to identify the chamber with some specific proposal.

Bosworth made it plain that his statement has always been the chamber's attitude on highway routes. It urges and works for improvements between points, but does not seek to specify the exact nature of those improvements.

The chamber directors asked Fred Hamilton, Shell Oil company manager here, to give them a memorandum on the fuel oil rate situation. Hamilton said that he believed fuel oil rates deserved study by the chamber of commerce rates committee, and pointed out the tremendous volume of fuel oil used in this territory.

Dies Committee To Probe Foreign War Propaganda

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP)—Chairman Dies (D-Tex.), announcing an inquiry into reports of communism and nazism in the motion picture industry, said today that the house committee on un-American activities may investigate foreign propaganda designed to involve the United States in European wars.

Disposing the results of a two-day private discussion of the future course of public and private hearings, Dies said:

"The committee took under consideration the question of foreign propaganda designed to involve us in the present European war, and it will announce

at a later date its decision with respect to the score of any inquiry along this line."

Dies announced that the committee had voted to:

1. Begin public hearings soon on nazi and communist activities on the west coast, including the motion picture industry.
2. Begin public hearings soon on reports of communist activities in consumer organizations and bring officers of those groups before the committee for questioning.
3. Investigate statements that communist and nazi agents from Mexico are carrying on subversive activities in the United States.
4. Continue its inquiry into the Christian front and Christian mobilizers.
