Smart Woman Gets in Shape Now for New Easter Outfit

It isn't too early to begin thinking about the way you firmly intend to look in your Easter outfit. The smart woman worries about her figure before she buys a spring suit instead of during the shopping spree.

She gets her hands in perfectly lovely condition long before starting to look for new gloves. From now until time to buy an Easter bonnet she works to make her hair shiny, healthy and beautiful. Then when, with the hat in hand, she goes to her hairdresser to talk about a new coiffure, he'll have pliable, elastic hair to work with—rather than dry, dull, lifeless-looking locks.

She goes on a sane diet now instead of a radical, fad diet to lose weight quickly later. She simply eats a little less of everything on every menu instead of cutting out several items. She knows that if she consumes fewer calories than her body burns up per day that she will lose weight. There's no compromising with that fact unless there is something organically wrong—in which case medical, not beauty advice, is needed.

Rolls Away The Bulges
She does exercise in the spot-reducing category. She rolls to take weight off her hips. She bends, stretches, twists and turns and bends again to make her waistline small. To make her stomach flat, she lies on the floor and, keeping ankles together, lifts legs slowly upward as far as possible, then lowers them just as slowly, meanwhile keeping hands above head.

She takes a brisk walk every day. She does posture exercises now and then to eliminate the hollow in the center of her backbone, to make stomach flat, chest high and shoulders square but perfectly relaxed.

She scrubs her face with soap and water at least once a day and occasionally uses a half-water and half-lemon juice bleach to remove the grayish tone that winter has left in her complexion. She uses night cream every

night, a mask treatment once a week, hand lotions and creams several times a day.

Not until the complexion treatments, the sensible diet, the exercises and the daily walk have had a chance to improve the texture and tone of her skin does she shop for new makeup. She knows that her new powder must match her natural skin tones. She has no intention of having to forego buying one of the new, rosy, glowing shades of powder because her complexion is grayish.
