

POLICE TAKE JAIL ESCAPE, OTHERS LEAVE

Eugene Mecum, city parole violator and escapee, was apprehended by officers late Wednesday and arrested on a drunk charge. Now Mecum must serve his previous sentence of \$100 or 50 days in jail, and in addition must serve out another sentence given him by Police Judge Carl K. Cook. Privileges were removed.

Two other prisoners, Orville Wright alias Castine Hunt, serving time on a drunk driving charge, and Ben Delap, in jail on a drunk charge, walked off the police set while doing outside work early Thursday. Officers are looking for the pair.

Eight bench warrants were issued to tardy motorists and the city coffers enriched to the tune of \$16. Two others paid fines of \$1 each. Five drunks and one "vag" appeared in police court Thursday.

It Will Pay If You Stay On Your Toes

Prominent beauty salons are giving more and more attention to exercises for the feet. Between routines to reduce hips or waistlines, the average exercise instructor teaches the customer how to do a few to relax the ankles, strengthen arches and, in general, make feet more comfortable as well as beautiful.

They agree with Bess Johnson, the radio star, that picking up marbles with the toes or standing on a thick book and curling toes over and under the edges of it are fine foot exercises.

After applying foot cream, Miss Johnson grasps the foot of one foot, then rotates the foot around and around, exercising ankle joints and arch as well. Then she does the same with the other foot.

Nowadays, smart women who know that beautiful feet usually are comfortable feet, have pedicures readily. While they are getting a facial or sitting under the hair drier, they have an expert operator manicure their toe-nails, massage foot cream from toes to ankles, use pumice where needed.

DON'T RUB TOES OFF

If you don't have professional pedicures, by all means invest in pedicure clippers which make it a simple matter to cut toenails straight across. And get a piece of pumice stone. Use the coarse side of an emery board for smoothing down nails after clipping. Use an orange stick, dipped in cuticle remover, for getting rid of dead skin around them.

Don't use pumice too vigorously. Simply put a bit of oil on the callouses or rough spots to be eliminated, then dip the pumice stone in soapy water and go over

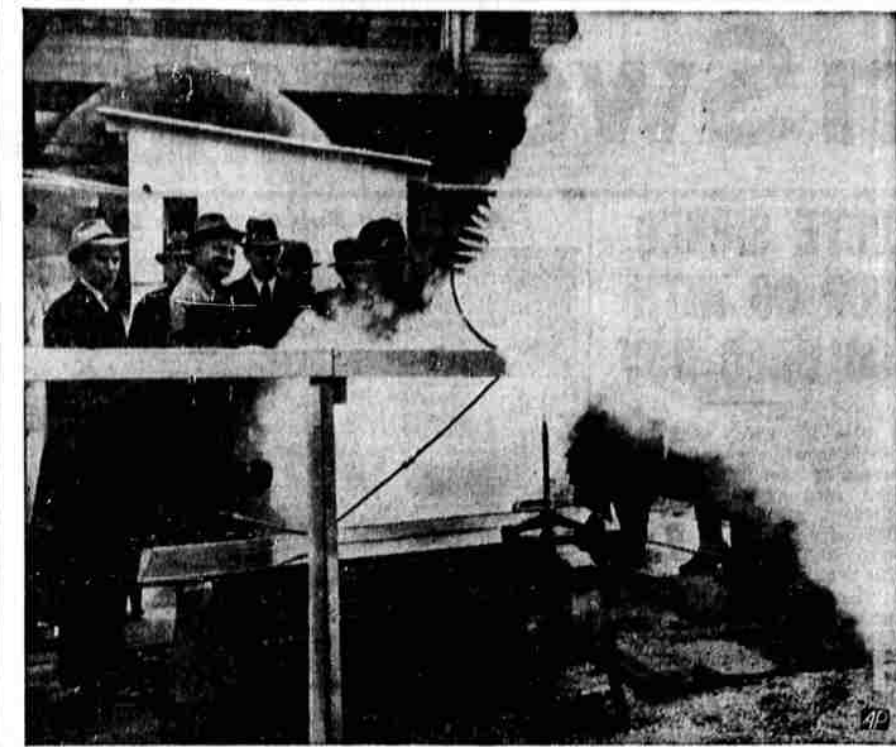

Grand Finale for Skiing Trek Is Hot Ham Biscuits, Coffee

MENU

BREAKFAST: Sliced bananas and stewed prunes, dry cereal, hot ham biscuits, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON: Scrambled frankfurters, French bread, baked apples, tea, milk.

DINNER: Pot roast of beef with vegetables, noodles, Brussels sprouts, celery and radishes, strawberry chiffon pie, coffee, milk.

Skiers have sharp appetites. When they come in a few ham biscuits and frankfurters, a big frosted cake and quarts of strong clear coffee will bring three cheers for their hosts. Let's look into the matter.

Hot Ham Biscuits
(Serves 6 to 8)

Two cups sifted flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons shortening, 1 cup finely diced cooked ham, 1 cup milk.

Sift dry ingredients together cut in shortening, add ham. Add

milk, mixing with a fork to form a soft dough. Toss on floured board and pat or roll to 1/2 inch thickness. Shape with biscuit cutter. Place on baking sheet and bake in a hot oven (450 deg. F.) for 12 to 15 minutes. (This makes 15 medium biscuits.)

This little number came from a dinner of the Society of Amateur Chefs:

Scrambled Frankfurters
(Serves 3)

Six eggs, slightly beaten, 6 tablespoons cream, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 1/2 cup chopped celery, 3 tender frankfurters (dinner size) sliced thin, toast triangles, anchovy paste, parsley.

Melt butter in heavy frying pan and saute frankfurter slices for a few minutes, browning all slices evenly. Turn down heat. Then add the eggs, cream, salt and celery, which have been mixed together. Scramble, stirring constantly. Until eggs are done. Remove from heat and serve on toast triangles spread with anchovy paste. Garnish with parsley.

Spicy Dish Makes Tasty Lenten Fare

Variety may be the spice of life, but spice is the excitement of Lenten recipes.

Scalloped Onions and Cheese
(Serves 4 to 6)

Two and one-half cups small cooked onions, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon celery salt, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1/2 cup American cheese, cut fine.

Melt butter in top of double boiler. Add flour and blend well. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly. Add cheese and seasoning and cook until creamy. Stir constantly while cooking. Butter casserole and fill with onions. Pour sauce over onions. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 20 minutes.

Egg Curry
(Serves 4 to 6)

Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon curry powder, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 tablespoon finely chopped onion, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 cups scalded milk, 4 hard cooked eggs, 1 cup steamed rice.

Cream butter and flour together. Add curry powder, paprika, chopped onion and salt. Stir well. Add scalded milk and cook until mixture thickens. Chop egg whites and add them with steamed rice to above mixture. Serve in small patty shells and garnish with grated egg yolks. Wonderful luncheon surprise.

LUNCHEON: Egg curry in patty shells, green peas, frosted gingerbread, fruit bowl, tea, milk.

HEARING SLATED IN TRUCK APPLICATION

The public utilities commissioner announced Thursday that a hearing will be held at the city hall on March 12, in the application of A. H. Busman and Elmer F. Merritt for a permit authorizing operations as a common carrier anywhere for hire.
