zenry must be informed if it is to do the governing and the voting," he said.

Mayor Tom Card, President Luther Taber of the Merrill Service club, Dr. F. E. Trotman and Melvin A. Bowman talked with the governor after wards about the mobile transi-ent camp at Merrill and various local problems.

Stops at Malin
Moving on down to Malin, the governor heard the Malin high school band play "Land of the Empire Builders," in his honor, and then delivered a brief address in the gymnasium. Diligence in work and character are the essentials of success, the governor told his hearers. He emphasized that there is no substitute for work and warned against theories that tolerate idleness and encourage reliance on the government to "take care of us."

"Do what is right and keep out of trouble," he advised the high school students.

Talks Problems
After the meeting Governor Sprague went to the Malin city hall where he discussed road and irrigation problems with Malin citizens.

The return to Klamath Falls was made by way of the Whitney bridge dam, where the governor watched a great, waving sheet of water flowing over into Lost river channel and down to the pump. His companions told him of the importance of the pump project to this community.

Addresses KUHS
Governor Sprague addressed the League of Women's Voters at noon, and in the early afternoon spoke at Klamath Union

high school assembly. He then went to the chamber of commerce to talk with irrigationists, including representatives of the Suburban league.

He was told of opposition among farmers on irrigated lands to establishment of limits on the supply of water which can be used, and extra charges for water used above those limits. This has been a matter of intense discussion among irrigationists here for several years.

Not Sentiment
It is the duty of the present parole board to review the cases of the more than 1000 men and women now in the state penitentiary. This would review the case of "forgotten men" who have served many years in the penal institution. Of the many cases before them the board has now examined to date 515 cases, some recommended for parole, others not. "Our parole board does not deal with 'sob-sister' sentiment," Governor Sprague remarked. "The board must review the cases of old violators, and consider the new. They must make a study of the case, reports of arresting officers, the presiding judge, district attorney, investigate the environment, the background, social conditions, and the mental restoration needed from the psychiatric viewpoint."

Finds Jobs
"We can't just turn a man out with \$5 and a new suit of clothes. First the board must find a job for the man. One great cause of revocation of parole is lack of self-support among those released. Of the 147 persons released by the new board, 108 have found employment through the board, and 28 arranged for their own employment."

"With the new system only 10 out of 117 violators were returned to prison," the governor pointed out. The governor told of the supervision given prisoners after their release and discussed the methods used. He stressed the value of youth organizations and completed his talk with a discussion of state institutions, all of which were "in good working order with the exception of the hospital for the insane which is inadequate to meet the needs of the 2600 population."

TRAINS TO RESUME MAINLINE ROUTES

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U. S. 101 to Portland, was closed at Scotia, where the bridge was out, but prospects were good that it could be re-opened by Sunday.

U. S. highway 99W and 99E, the valley routes north, were open to Oregon.

Early Friday morning, the railway said, damaged lines were repaired between Sacramento and Redding on the western valley line, and north of Dunsmuir. It said the east valley line would be open about noon.

Still Blocked
Washouts and slides still block the line between Redding and Dunsmuir. This will take several days to repair. Meanwhile trains will be run on a consolidated schedule, passengers will be shuttled by bus between Redding and Dunsmuir, and mail and express by truck.

Bus service will continue to furnish transportation between San Jose and Santa Cruz for several days until blocked rail lines are repaired.

The Northwestern Pacific reported it was operating on its steam line between Sausalito and Eureka with bus shuttle service around tied up sections of rail.

George Erickson, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, made this statement Friday:
Every effort will be made to make our passengers comfortable while en route, and we suggest if there is any way in which the officers or employees of the company can be of help to our passengers that they make known their desires.

For passengers departing for points north of Klamath Falls, we would suggest that they call the local passenger station for train information and for passengers leaving from San Francisco-Oakland to Klamath Falls, trains are departing from those points on regular schedule, arriving at Klamath Falls approximately eight to nine hours late due to the detour via Reno and Alturas. The management is doing everything humanly possible to repair that part of the railroad between Black Butte and Gerber which was damaged, and all Shasta route trains will be returned to their normal route at the earliest possible moment.

Donat Beats Gable to Keep "Wind" From Film Record As Academy Awards Announced

HOLLYWOOD, March 1 (AP)—Clark Gable, wherever he may be, is Hollywood's "forgotten man" of the moment.

But for Mr. Gable, "Gone With the Wind" would have swept the field last night in the motion picture academy of arts and sciences' 11th annual selection of premier film accomplishments.

"GWTW" did all right, anyway. To the surprise of no one, it walked off with eight of 16 possible awards, including those for the best production, best actress, best supporting actress and best director. Not since "It Happened One Night" grabbed off all the top honors in 1934 has a picture done as well.

Only Robert Donat, among the principal contestants, survived the big gale. It was he who edged out Gable as the outstanding actor for his masterful portrayal of 50 years in an English schoolmaster's life in "Goodbye, Mr. Chips."

Neither Donat nor Gable was among those present. Donat is in England and Gable left Hollywood yesterday for a short vacation.

Vivien Leigh made the top acting awards a sweep for England. The British girl, who skyrocketed to stardom as the fiery southern Scarlett, was on hand to happily accept her "Oscar."

Victor Fleming, whose direction of the film brought him top honors in that class, was ill in bed with influenza.

Hattie McDaniel, memorable "Mammy" in "Wind," captured the prize as the best supporting actress and with it became the first negro ever to be honored by the academy. Other awards given those connected with the production included:

The late Sidney Howard for the screen play and Lyle Wheeler for the art direction.

Other awards went to: Thomas Mitchell in "Stagecoach" as the best supporting actor.

Lewis R. Foster, for the best original motion picture story, "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington."

Bernard B. Brown for the best sound recording in "When Tomorrow Comes."

Gregg Toland for the best black and white photography in "Wuthering Heights."

Herbert Stothart for the best original musical score, in "The Wizard of Oz."

Walter Wanger, Richard Hage-

man, Frank Harling, John Leopold and Leo Shuken for the best musical scoring in "Stagecoach."

E. Y. Harburg and Harold Arlen for the best song, "Over the Rainbow" from "The Wizard of Oz."

Walt Disney for his cartoon, "The Ugly Duckling"; Paramount for the best one-reel short, "Busy Little Bears" and Warner Bros. for the best two-reel short, "Sons of Liberty."

Another special honor went to Judy Garland, young singer, for work as "an outstanding juvenile."

Harry, one of seven children of widowed Mrs. Agnes Larsen who had tried in vain to get on relief rolls, was found dead in his bedroom by George Stevens, a school friend, who had come to work on arithmetic lessons with him.

Police said neighbors who were questioned told them that only the eldest child was working "for about five or six dollars a week." They said they had heard Harry say "I'd about as soon be dead as eat mush all the time."
