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LOCAL FLOODS PASS PEAK AS GROUND DRIES

Peaks of the floods on various Klamath streams had passed Friday and a brisk wind began drying the surface of the saturated soils of the big basin.

Water continued to pour at the rate of about 700 second feet over Whitney bridge dam, south of Merrill, and on down the Lost river channel into the Tule lake sump.

Governor Charles A. Sprague, accompanied by several Klamath men, was shown the overflow, which is adding to the seriousness of the situation on the sump. Local civic interests hoped the unwanted water would give a final push to the sump reclamation project, now before congress.

Measurements on the Williamson river showed the water receding after Thursday's high. Lost river was reported eight inches lower in the Langell valley area.

Upper Klamath lake was filling up, but was still more than a foot below the height permitted in Copco's contract with the government.
