

TRANSFERS OF LAND MADE BY OLD RESIDENTS

TULELAKE — Three large real estate transfers were announced this week with the sale of the 100-acre stock ranch on the Tulelake-Crook highway owned for the past 40 years by George Courtwright, of interest to all residents of the Klamath basin.

Courtwright, a resident of Modoc county for 50 years, has served many years as justice of the peace of Modoc county and was associated for a long time with the California fish and game department as game warden.

His land was sold to Frank Griffith, Merrill. Mr. and Mrs. Courtwright are moving to Grants Pass, Ore., where they purchased property just outside the city limits.

Stanley Johnson, Malin, is the second purchaser of a large tract of land, having acquired the Livingston stock range of 2700 acres on Bryant mountain. Johnson and Griffith will both run cattle on their newly purchased ranches.

Both sales were completed by M. A. Bowman, Merrill.

R. W. Steele and son, J. R. Steele, whose 1200 acres of land on the California side of the line went back to sump this winter with the breaking of dikes, bought the 120-acre Hood ranch north and east of Malin this week.

Consideration in all of the transfers was not made public.

LOOKOUT MILL TO DOUBLE OUTPUT

LOOKOUT—The Davis Creek lumber company, whose mill is on the Great Northern railway west of Lookout, will work two shifts the coming season, employing about one hundred men, and plans to cut 16,000,000 board feet this year, according to A. Zamboni, who said that operations will start the first of April, weather permitting. Last year's cut was 7,250,000 feet.

Work has started on wiring the mill and lumber camp for electric light and power. Current will be furnished by the Surprise Valley electrification corporation, an REA cooperative which extended its lines to "Zamboni's" this winter. Electric motors will be used in the mill to run the edger, greenchain, pumps and log hoist.

A new cookhouse and several new cabins will be built to take care of an increase in the number of employees. Zamboni and J. Castelli are the company.

J. J. Potter and Sons' small lumber mill northwest of Lookout is also being electrified to use the REA current.

LAKEVIEW ROTARY HEARS CLUB HEAD

LAKEVIEW HEARS CHAMBER ENVOYS

LAKEVIEW — Marcia Sloss and Stanley Decious, executives of the Alturas chamber of commerce visited Lakeview this week for the purpose of securing complete data in support of Lake county's request to the joint congressional committee on forestry that ways and means be adapted by congress whereby the counties of the western states containing mature national forest timber will receive adequate compensation for government timber which is traded for deeds to private property instead of being sold for cash.

The visitors stated that Modoc county will duplicate the exhaustive brief which the Lake county court and the forestry committee of the Lake county chamber of commerce has presented to congress. Sloss, who is also editor of the Modoc County Record stated that he will soon publish a series of articles stressing the importance of such a legislation to Modoc county.

Speakers from Lake county will appear in the near future at meetings in Modoc county for the purpose of fully explaining the necessity of securing adequate legislation which will protect in every way the twenty-five per cent equity which the counties have in the national forest timber and the revenue therefrom.

IMPORTANT! Carefully observe timing for each method. Measure 2 level tablespoons of coffee to each cup of water. Very water slightly for exact strength desired. Keep coffee-maker clean.

DRIP METHOD: 6 to 8 minutes preferred. If less than 2/3 capacity is made, water will drip too fast, giving weak coffee.

GLASS VACUUM-MAKER: Put upper bowl on after water boils. The coffee and water should be in contact 5 to 7 minutes.

PERCOLATOR: Start with cold or hot water. Percolate slowly 7 to 10 minutes after steady pumping starts.

COFFEEPOT: Bring coffee to boiling. Stir. Remove from fire. Add a little cold water and let stand 5 minutes to settle.

STEEPING: Pour boiling water on coffee. Stir well. Stir again in 5 minutes. Steep for a total of 10 to 15 minutes.

Hint of the week

If your coffee-maker is one that requires a cloth filter, be sure after each using to thoroughly wash the filter in cold water—never with soap. Do not let the cloth dry out—keep it in a glass of water when not in use.
