LUMBER COMPANY SEES HEAVY CUT

LITTLE VALLEY, Calif.—The Butte Valley lumber company expects to cut 10,000,000 board feet of lumber this year in its mill here, as compared with a production of 7,000,000 feet in 1939. About 100 men will be employed and the management states that all jobs have been filled.

Operations will start this spring as soon as the ground is dry enough to move logs and lumber. The mill was reconstructed a year ago and only minor repairs this winter were needed to make it ready for the 1940 run.

The mill is on the Western Pacific railroad 20 miles south of Bleber. Theo L. Nye is general manager, J. D. Welch, Jr., mill superintendent, and Harry C. Welch in charge of yard and shipping.
