## OREGON PTA PUTS CANDIDATE UP FOR NATIONAL OFFICE

The announcement has been made here that Mrs. William Kietzer of Portland will be a nominee this spring for the presidency of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers. Her name headed the list of recommended candidates submitted to the national board by its nominating committee, of which Mrs. Clarence W. Wallis, also of Portland, the president of the Oregon congress, is serving as chairman.

Mrs. Kietzer is serving now as the vice president of the national organization, elected from its northwest region which includes Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. Before that, she was for four years the president of the Oregon congress which she had served previously as first vice president, as corresponding secretary, as publicity chairman and as safety chairman. She is also a past president of the Irvington PTA association of Portland.

In addition to her parent-teacher activities, Mrs. Kietzer is serving this year as Americanism chairman for the Oregon department of the American Legion auxiliary; as chairman of the program committee for Portland Sorosis and as a member of the magazine committee of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs.

Election of national officers for the parent-teacher congress will take place at its convention in May in Omaha. Besides the presidency, the offices to be filled this year are those of first vice president and aide to the president; secretary, treasurer and vice president from region No. 1, which includes New York and the New England states. Additional nominations may be made from the floor.

Mrs. Kietzer is well known in Klamath Falls where she visited often as president of the Oregon Congress. She was also active during the state convention held here last year.

## Five Men Rescued From Mine Cave-In

**STOYESTOWN, Pa., March 5 (UP)**—Five miners trapped eight hours in a small domestic coal mine a mile and a half north of here were freed uninjured last night by rescue crews who tunneled 30 feet through a rockfall to reach them.

The men, Orrin Dummier and his son, Roy, and William McKicker and his two sons, Robert and Peter, were trapped by the rockfall in the Maust mine, a small shaft operated by Dummier and producing coal only for domestic purposes.

Volunteer workers from nearby mines, which include the Reading mine of the Reading Iron company, reached the trapped miners at 7:30 tonight. The men had been trapped since 11:30 this morning.

The five attempted to break through into the shaft of another mine, but they found it blocked, too, and there was nothing they could do but wait until the rescue squads reached them.
