Crypt of Civilization Soon To Be Sealed Until AD 8113

Archaeologists of 6000 years in the future will have made the most startling discovery in the history of man when they force their way into the Crypt of Civilization in Georgia, which is to be sealed in May to remain untouched until A. D. 8113, according to Dr. I. K. Peters, Oglethorpe university architect in charge of the project.

As one of the final contributions to the crypt, the Rosicrucian order of San Jose, Calif., has sent manuscripts of their philosophical doctrines to be included with the chosen works of music, art, literature and science to be interred in the vault, it was announced by Mrs. Florence Howard, local member of the Rosicrucian order.

The Crypt of Civilization, begun at Oglethorpe university several years ago, is made of stone in which is set a door of stainless steel 50 inches wide and 150 inches high. The interior walls and ceilings are lined with vitreous porcelain enamel and will have fused on them colored designs depicting today's life much in the manner of the tombs of Egypt.
