Mobile Camp Plan Given Boost By Tulalake Groups

TULALAKE — With the city council, all civic organizations of Tulalake, Gordon Jacobs, chairman of the Siskiyou county board of supervisors, J. W. Ross, Yreka, of the state employment service, and John Mackay, of the state relief administration, all in favor of the project, prospects for establishment of a mobile camp for transient workers here next fall looms as more than a possibility.

Mackay, Ross and Jacobs, meeting with farmers and others interested in the problem of better housing for the hundreds of transient workers who pour into the basin should be brought here next fall.

Residents here were warned of the possibility of a protest from the state labor commissioner and the state board of health if action is not taken to provide better sanitation and habitable quarters.

Last season between 3500 and 4000 people were registered in the basin. Hundreds lived in makeshift shelters in the plot provided by the city just outside the city limits. Other hundreds slept and ate in shelter of trees, on ditch banks or under lean-tos made of cardboard cartons.

The influx of workers presents a serious problem to law enforcement authorities here and in contrast, Ross described the self governed camp, loaned Oregon last year by California, that was established at Merrill.

Nearly 200 families took advantage of the tent frames, hot and cold water, provided for domestic use and laundry, services of the camp nurse and a local doctor and other conveniences. Merrill reported no infraction of city rules in the three months that the camp was located there.

Locality of the camp will be determined later when work on the city water system gets underway. Several acreages are available close to town.

Ross stated that rent on the ground for the camp will be paid by the farm security administration and that grocery orders are also provided by the SFA, if workers arrive before the harvest starts, eliminating any chance that transients out of funds will demand help of organizations or individuals.

Only cost to the community

if a camp is sent here will be the laying of water mains to a point where mains from the camp may be attached.

All other civic organizations in Siskiyou and Modoc counties, state congressman and others will receive copies of the resolution to be drafted here asking support of the project.

To further interest in the plan Mayor Booth appointed a nominating committee who in turn nominated W. H. Anderson, president of the chamber of commerce; F. P. Addleman, master of the Tulalake grange; Gordon Jacobs, chairman of the Siskiyou county board of supervisors; Mayor Lou Booth; Otto Schultz, president of the Tulalake Potato Growers association; Eddie Gresham, commander of the Tulalake Legion post; Dan Crawford, of the Modoc county farm group, and Clark Fensler, local representative of a California sugar beet company. This committee will present the problem to other organizations and at a near future date will send a delegation to San Francisco for a conference with FSA officials.

Mackay, in a few brief remarks, chided Tulalake residents for being shy and backward about asking for outside support for needed community projects, reminding his audience that Tulalake was part of Siskiyou county and the state of California, paid taxes and was entitled to recognition.

Mayor Booth, calling for a standing vote on sentiment toward the proposed camp, received a unanimous vote.

SCHOOL HEADS TO HOLD CONFERENCE AT SALEM SOON

Superintendent Fred Peterson of the Klamath county public schools is a member of the committee on custodial administration for the annual conference of city superintendents to be held in Salem on Friday and Saturday, March 15 and 16, under the joint auspices of the department of superintendence of the Oregon State Teachers association and Rex Putnam, state

superintendent of public instruction. E. H. Hedrick, superintendent of the Medford public schools, as president of the department of superintendence, will preside at this conference. J. W. King, principal of the high school at La Grande, is secretary. Important committee reports will be given on the following subjects: custodial administration and training; vocational education; teacher education and training for elementary schools; criteria for evaluating elementary schools; and coordination of health activities. The opening address of the

conference will be given by Governor Charles A. Sprague and will be followed by an address by Rex Putnam, superintendent of public instruction. All of the general meetings of the conference will be held in the hearing room of the state capitol. It is anticipated that approximately 150 superintendents and principals will be in attendance.
