Fraternities take extra time. How well we freshmen realize

that. Whenever the house does something, the freshmen furnish the man power.

This pulling boys away from their school work is naturally going to bring some of them down in their grades.

Again, the secret of success is the organization of time. Those who organize their time can do the extra work and do their school work too. Often the ones who carry the brunt of the extra work are also the leaders in school work.

The social position of fraternities is a topic of much discussion, especially among high school seniors who are staring ahead to the time when they will come to college. The social advantages of fraternities, if any, are overrated.

Those joining a fraternity expecting to find it an "open sesame" to a glorious social world are doomed to disappointment. Fraternities can be an aid socially, but that depends on the individual. Mere membership in a fraternity does not give higher social standing. At times I think it gives a disadvantage.

Scholastically the weak around a fraternity tend to pull down the strong. In every house there will be one or two parasites who do no work and depend upon copying some one else's notebook, or getting the fellow who gets A's in comp to do their themes. Most college students are guilty to a degree of cribbing other's work. The ones who cause trouble are the chronic cribbers.

Your activities in many ways are curbed by fraternity membership. However, most realize this when they obligate themselves to join. It goes under the price you pay to belong to an organization. Naturally, when you ally with an organization you lose some of your personal identity.

Personally, I have come to the conclusion that fraternities aren't all they're cracked up to be. Where they fall down in some respects they give unforeseen advantages that may balance up the scale.

For high school students who expect to come to college, don't look to fraternity life as synonymous with college life. It isn't. If you don't join a fraternity you may not be missing as much as some who say too much and think too little might have you believe.
