IMPORTANT! Carefully observe timing for each method. Measure 2 level tablespoons of coffee to each cup of water. Vary water slightly for exact strength desired. Keep coffee-maker clean.

Drip Method: 6 to 8 minutes preferred. If less than 2 1/2 cups is made, water will drip too fast, giving weak coffee.

GLASS VACUUM-MAKER: Put upper bowl on after water boils. The coffee and water should be in contact 5 to 7 minutes.

PERCOLATOR: Start with cold or hot water. Percolate slowly 7 to 10 minutes after steadily pumping starts.

COFFEE POT: Bring coffee to boiling. Stir. Remove from fire. Add a little cold water and let stand 5 minutes to settle.

STEeping: Pour boiling water on coffee. Stir well. Steep again in 5 minutes. Steep for a total of 10 to 15 minutes.

Hint of the week

Most coffee-makers produce best results when operated at or near full capacity. 2 or 3 cups cannot be made satisfactorily in a 6 to 8 cup maker. When only 1 or 2 cups are desired, the Steeping Method is recommended.
