ENTRANCE EXAMS SLATED APRIL 13 AT TULELAKE HIGH

TULELAKE—Prospective students desiring to qualify for entrance in any college which requires national college entrance board examinations may take the college entrance tests at the Tulelake high school beginning at 8:45 Saturday, April 13, it was announced this week by George Reiben, principal of the high school.

Reiben stated that the tests, offered in April and June each year, will be given only on that one date in April in this area. Anyone planning on a higher educational program must register before March 16, application to be made to the above board at 431 West 117th street, New York City.
